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AS PRESIDENT OF TEXAS BAPTIST HOME, PLANS FOR REPLACEMENT TO BE DECIDED

WAXAHACHIE—On March 2, 2017 Texas Baptist Home President Eddie Marsh resigned his position. The Home board of trustees met in special session on March 9 and officially accepted his resignation. Bro. Eddie had earlier informed the board of his intent to announce his retirement in April, but the move was expedited.

CURRENT HOME STATUS

By policy, Randy Odom, executive vicepresident of TBH, automatically became interim Home president upon the vacancy. He has been with the Home for 26 years, and we are blessed to have his experience of having been through a presidential transition two other times.

We are also blessed to have an experienced program administrator Jami Hogan who has served at the Home for 15 years. In addition, the current Home staff is one of the strongest in recent memory. So, with the grace of God and guidance of the Holy Spirit, the Home will continue to function as fully and normally as possible until a replacement president can be elected.

PLANS FOR REPLACEMENT

With the aforementioned experienced staff on board, the TBH trustees decided to give a month of prayer to the Lord for guidance and wisdom in proceeding with a search for a new president nominee. At our next regular trustee meeting on April 11, the trustees plan to decide on a selection process and timeline in



seeking a nominee to present for consideration by the BMA of Texas churches. We hope to have this person named by mid-summer.

Whenever the board is ready to receive applications and resumes from potential candidates, this will be announced through *Baptist Progress*, *The Southern Baptist Texan*, and the *Baptist Progress* website.

HONORING BRO. EDDIE

Bro. Eddie Marsh has served as TBH president for the past 12 plus years. He was also a TBH trustee for several years prior to becoming president. In addition to serving at TBH, Bro. Eddie and his wife Lynda have been faithful servants of the Lord in various capacities of the BMA. He served as an interstate missionary when a BMA church was

planted in Bowling Green, Kentucky. He also served in the establishment of a State Mission project at Meadow Park, Mt. Vernon.

Bro. Eddie has been pastor of the following BMA churches: Clear Creek, Marquez; Temple, Marshall (youth pastor); Sheppard Drive, Euless (3 times); Opelika, Brownsboro; and First, New Summerfield.

The trustees have voted to continue to provide salary, insurance, etc., for Bro. Eddie until he can get his social security, Medicare coverage, and retirement benefits started.

The board plans to honor Bro. Eddie and Lynda with a reception at the state association in November at New Harmony, Tyler. It is also customary to honor retiring department heads with honorarium love offerings from the churches. Therefore, the Home trustees are suggesting local churches send a letter/card of thanks to the Marshes and include an offering if possible. Your church might consider giving \$12 for each of the 12 years of service (\$144) or any amount more or less that you are able.

Pastor, serve it up fresh

When I resigned my last pastorate in 2006, we packed up all the belongings we needed and cherished, and sent the rest to the landfill.

One of the items that went to the landfill was my metal file box, filled with hundreds of sermons I had preached over the previous four decades. In following years, whenever I mentioned this from the pulpit, the responses were gasps, winces and grimaces. How dare a man, who calls himself a man of God, discard sacred sermons which God had laid on his heart through the years? Why, that borders on blasphemy! They could have been bound in a book and placed in seminaries for other young preachers to study.

The discarding was not done out of a temper tantrum, neither in defiance of God - nor the church, or anything else. It was a result of the suggestion by a preacher friend years earlier who made the statement, "The best thing a pastor could ever do for his church is to discard all his old sermons and start afresh."

I found that in looking at those pages in my metal box, many were worn and tattered around the edges from having been retrieved and preached again, and again. Many which I retrieved were sermons which I glared at, with a perplexed, puzzled look wondering what on earth I was thinking when I prepared it.

Did you notice the two-word phrase used in a previous paragraph — "start afresh?"

Regretfully, on numerous occasions when I stepped into the pulpits, with a recycled sermon, I was anything but fresh. Warmed-over, molded mac and cheese could not have been more stale.

Discarding the old sermons was my way of expressing a desire and intention to God the Father, to never again, step into the pulpit warmed over and stale. Never again would I just whip out a "Saturday night special" just so I would have something to say the next morning.

Preacher, if we have nothing to say, we're better off to follow Charles Spurgeon's example, and walk into our pulpits, weeping bitterly, and confessing to our congregations, "I have no message today - you are free to go home."

The story goes that on that day, the congregation of the great Metropolitan Tabernacle of London, left that morning, likewise weeping and mourning over their broken pastor, and the majority spent the entire afternoon agonizing over, and praying for God to endue him with power. That night, it was noted that he stepped behind his "rail" and preached with unusual power and fire.

Today, the First Baptist Church of Palmer may have messages lacking in the luster of a great orator — or the depth of a great theologian or biblical professor. But what they do have are messages which have been labored over, and which were born out of an intense desire to search the scripture and find age-old truths

which have perhaps never been explored by him — to find the meaning of a context, and to try, as best as the pastor can, to extract those truths and make the right application. To do otherwise is like loading my gun with chewed bubblegum.

Pastors, our churches do not need our warmed overs, our Saturday night specials, or a borrowed sermon from someone else. I don't know about the rest of you, but if I stood in the pulpit and read someone else's sermon, I might as well read "The Great Gadsby" to my congregation.

Pastors, our churches want to hear the pure, unadulterated word of God, preached with fervor, with power, from a heart which has obviously labored in tears. They can overlook our poor grammar and a few annoying mannerisms — but they do not want to hear what Charles Stanley, John MacArthur or John Hagee has to say - if they wanted to know that, they would have stayed home in front of the TV.

We enter our favorite restaurant, expecting freshness, heavenly aroma, great flavor, and the satisfaction of a full stomach when the last bite has been consumed. If we receive otherwise, we will likely not return. In like manner, your congregation enters the house of God to absorb a fresh, "labored over" carefully prepared, fervently delivered, genuine word from God. When we give them less, we have deprived them, and worse, we have dishonored our loving God.

New Harmony Baptist Church Celebrated 150 Years

The New Harmony Baptist Church, located in a small community twelve miles northwest of Tyler, celebrated its 150th anniversary on April 15, 2017. New Harmony has long been a member of the Baptist Missionary Association of Texas. In the first 100 years of existence, the church had 35 pastors. In the past 50 years, two interim pastors and two pastors have served the church. Bro. W.H. Hodges preceded Bro. H.L. Lee for a short time. Bro. Lee led the church for almost 23 years. Bro. Ralph Cottrell was an interim prior to the calling of Bro. Robbie Caldwell, who has recently celebrated 25 years of service to the

It was a step of faith when 18 residents met on the Saturday before the third Sunday in April 1867, to establish the Harmony Baptist Church. The church changed its name to New Harmony Baptist Church when it joined the old Cherokee Baptist Association in 1869, because a Harmony Church was already an association member. Many of New Harmony's charter members had previously belonged to Indian Creek Baptist Church, which had been located near what is now called the Beaird Cemetery, just off Highway 64. Unable to survive after the Civil War took all of the men of the church into battle, Indian Creek Church disbanded. When John Wood Barron returned from his duty of service, he tried to rally the members only to find that the deep wounds from the war would not allow that to happen. Moving north to what would become the New Harmony community, Mr. Barron took the leadership role to establish a new church in the spring of 1867. Twelve of his family members and five neighbors joined him. Today, there are 38 members of New Harmony Baptist Church who are descendants and spouses of the original 18 charter members.

In the 150 years, the church has worshipped their Lord, there have been 22 men who were licensed or ordained to the ministry, and a total of 67 deacons have served the members of the church. Six sanctuaries have housed the members. The first was a log



structure built near the present cemetery in the community on land that was donated by William and Julia Gimble. By 1887, there was a need for a new structure, and once again John Wood Barron stepped up in a leadership role and donated land for that building site that later became the address for the parsonage. By 1907, a need for a new sanctuary existed. The son of John Wood Barron, Joseph Franklin Barron, donated land across the road, where all future church buildings would be constructed. That worship center only lasted eight years, when a storm damaged it. A fourth building was erected in 1915 while World War I was raging. That site of worship would also serve the church through World War II. Just prior to the end of that war, the church, in another step of faith, began the discussion for a new church building. John Barron, Rush Beasley, Coke Barron, Edell Cates, Carl Adams, and Jodie Newton all planted one acre of cotton and gave the proceeds to the building fund. In May 1949, the church dedicated their fifth site of worship. This structure still stands today, and is used for classrooms and the library. In 1993, the sixth sanctuary was built where two services are now held with an average attendance of 400.

The hill is quiet now. The Jews celebrate, their hated rival is in the grave. The soldiers celebrate, their work is done. But I didn't celebrate. I was there that day. I'm Mary Magdalene.

I gasped at the whirring sound of the Roman whip as it shredded His human flesh. lesus no longer resembled the teacher who walked our towns teaching, healing, loving. I wept as I saw how they pushed that mocking crown of thorns into His scalp . . . until His face shone crimson with His own blood. When I looked up at Him, my heart refused to register what my eyes witnessed. His breathing was becoming more shallow, the movement of his chest barely visible.

He could no longer push Himself up to get a breath. His flesh tore where the spikes had been driven. This was the end. The man, Jesus, who had loved me was

That was Friday. Today is Sunday. We're going to the tomb. No words flow from our lips, only fresh tears that wash our cheeks and broken hearts that are heavy with grief. The hill seems steeper, but finally the tomb is in sight. We manage to run the last few steps . . . only to see that something is terribly wrong. The stone? It has been

How can I bear this? He was the only person who ever treated me with dignity. How I loved Him! I thought He was Messiah, that's what Peter and the other apostles thought too. Wasn't it enough that He died? Now this. Someone has stolen His body!

We rushed inside. Am I dreaming? Has grief stolen my mind? Suddenly, two men in clothes that gleamed like lightning stood beside us. Terrified, we hit the ground face down, bowing low before those . . . those beings.

The words they were about to speak would change the world, "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; He has risen!" (Luke 24:6-7). Then I remembered.

ecommendations for the BMA of America Meeting, scheduled for May 1-3 at the Arlington Convention Center in Arlington have been released to Baptist Progress and include the following:

COMMITTEE ON ARRANGEMENTS

The Committee on Arrangements is recommending that the 2020 meeting be held at the Farley Street Baptist Church in Waxahachie, April 27-29, 2020. The Fairfield Inn & Suites Marriott will serve as the lead hotel.

MORAL ACTION

- 1. That Dr. John M. Adams stand as a nominee for Executive Director of Moral Action.
- 2. That the proposed Moral Action budget be approved. (\$65,464.98)
- 3. That our churches and pastors embrace and support our nation by participating and promoting the National Day of Prayer, May 4, 2017 to join other Americans in praying for our nation. Meetings can be conducted at town halls, city halls, county courthouses and State houses.
- 4. That all our BMA churches schedule June 25 or July 2, as the Moral Action "Freedom Offering" Sunday. This is an opportunity to honor or give memorials for our soldiers, both past and present.
- 5. That our local associations, our local and state WMA and Brotherhoods, and our local churches be encouraged to give a financial gift or a budgeted monthly gift to Moral Action. These funds will strengthen this ministry.
- 6. That Dr. John M. Adams, Executive Director, represent the BMA of America in Washington, D.C. by encouraging and contacting our United States Senators, Congressmen, and other Christian moral/political organizations such as the American Family Association (AFA), Focus on the Family, Family Research Council, Alliance Defending Freedom, Heritage Foundation and AFA
- 7. That our Baptist Missionary Association of America reaffirm and approve these six (6) Moral Action resolutions and that they be mailed to the President, United States Senators, the United States House of Representatives, and the United States Supreme Court.
- 8. That we humbly request that these resolutions be printed in our BMA state newspapers.
- 9. That the BMA churches recognize and honor our grandparents and great grandparents on Grandparents Day September 10, 2017. They have so often set the highest of morals.


10. That our churches, pastors, and church staff /deacons utilize the 2 Moral Action web-pages: www.macbma.net and www.moralactionofms.net

LIFEWORD MEDIA MINISTRIES

- 1. That we adopt the proposed operating budget for 2017. (\$1,305,519)
- 2. That Sunday, October 22, 2017, be set aside as Lifeword
- 3. That the housing allowance be set at \$2,500 per month for the broadcast officer, creative officer, financial officer, program director, and executive director for this year and beyond until
- 4. That the executive director be paid a base salary of \$76,984, one-half of Social Security/Medicare, health and dental insurance, retirement at 6 percent of salary and an auto allowance. Note: The recommended compensation is based on an independent evaluation of the executive director position by Phillip Blount and Associates, an independent compensation consulting firm used by a number of Baptist groups. Compensation levels are determined through a threestep process—job analysis, job evaluation, and extensive market research. The recommended amount is at the 25th percentile level.
- 5. That Lifeword change from a calendar financial year to a fiscal financial year beginning June 1 and ending May 31, effective June 1, 2017.
- 6. That a rising vote of appreciation be given for the following board members who have completed their second term of service: Arthur McMillen and Barbara Steele, as well as Pat McNeel, who passed away in 2016.
- 7. That Donny Parrish stand as a nominee for Executive Director.

MINISTERS RESOURCE SERVICES

- 1. That Ron Chesser stand as nominee for Executive Director of Ministers Resource Services.
- 2. That the Executive Director's annual base salary remain the same at \$63,800 with \$18,000 of that amount being designated as housing allowance for IRS purposes.
 - 3. That the budget of \$249,113.57 be approved.
- 4. We urge each church to enroll her pastor and church staff in the BMA Retirement Plan at Ministers Resource Services.
- 5. We urge our pastors and their wives to enroll in the Ministers Benevolent Society and Auxiliary.
- 6. We urge each church to include Ministers Resource Services in her monthly budgeted offerings to the various



departments and agencies of the BMA.

BAPTIST MISSIONARY ASSOCIATION THEOLOGICAL **SEMINARY**

- 1. Affirmation of the proposed budget (\$1,483,218.73)
- 2. Re-affirm the appointment of Dr. Charley Holmes as president.
- 3. Each church observe Sunday, May 21, 2017, as Scholarship Sunday with:
 - special prayer for our graduates.
- receive a special scholarship offering to support the training of future BMA pastors and missionaries on that Sunday.

DISCIPLEGUIDE

- 1. We recommend the adoption of the 2017 DiscipleGuide Budget. (\$1,070,063)
- 2. We recommend that Scott Attebery stand as a nominee for the position of Executive Director of DiscipleGuide.

Director of International Missions to step down at BMA Missions



Volunteer Student Missions trains over 100 for mission trips

Recently, nearly 100 students and leaders going on 12 different international/national mission trips gathered at Petit Jean Mountain for World Missions Weekend. This is the new name for the training of Volunteer Student Missions. The time was divided into team times and lessons on how to prepare our hearts spiritually, how to be respectful of the various cultures we will be encountering, and how to serve and encourage the long-term missionaries in any and every way.

This was the first time and only time teams met together to plan before heading to the mission field. This weekend was vital for teams to learn how to work together, despite differences, to accomplish their goal of encouraging and aiding the missionaries in any and every way possible. Many teams used this time to plan for the activities, such as Vacation Bible Schools, that they had scheduled for their trips. Other teams used their time to really get to know each other and to form bonds and friendships that would enhance their experience on the mission field.

During the course of the weekend we heard from great disciple-makers and missionaries: Bro. Donny Parrish, Dr. John David Smith, Bro. Phil Knott, Bro. Eric Johnson and Bro. Andy Comer. We were challenged to be global Christians, to seek service and not glory while on the mission field, and to have a heart rooted in the Gospel. We were encouraged and challenged to be on mission in our communities while preparing for our mission trips. We were also taught important protocols and procedures for traveling to foreign countries and being respectful one there.

World Missions Weekend is a time of training, fellowshipping and worship that is indispensible for the students and leaders going on these trips all over the world. Going into a different culture can shock all of us and we must be prepared for those circumstances before they come. This weekend is all about preparing our hearts and minds as we go into these new places and without it, we could not be effective on our trips.

The missionary will be responsible for raising his or her funds based on an approved budget that will provide whatever personal support and ministry funds needed.
- 4. We recommend that Michael Barton be extended for one year in Canada, to be reviewed on a yearly basis.
- 5. We recommend to partner with the replant of Temple Baptist Church (Little Rock, AR) now called South City Church, at \$2,000 per month stipend for one year, to be re-evaluated after one year.
- 6. We recommend Jordan and Sarah Bowen to a self-funded missional church planting residency/internship.
- 7. We recommend Nathan Brewer as a church planter to Oklahoma City with a stipend of \$2,000 a month. We also recommend Thomas Mobly as Nathan's associate church

planter, Thomas will raise his own funds/support.

- 8. We recommend forgiving the loan amount of \$39,965.32 on the four loans in South Korea.
- 9. We recommend a stipend of \$2,000 through May 2017 for John Bienlein to continue the ministry for the deaf.
- 10. We recommend the election of Eric Johnson as the new International Missions Director effective May 2017. We also recommend that Phil Knott stay on in his role until June 2018, this is to help Eric transition into his new role.
- 11. We want to commend Dr. John David Smith on his selection of Eric Johnson as Director of International Missions.
- 12. We want to express our thanks to Phil and LaJuana Knott for their work in Costa Rica and in the Missions Office.
- 13. We recommend the 2017 budget as presented by the Missions Department. (\$2,974,178)
- 14. We recommend the re-election of Dr. John David Smith as Executive Director of BMAA Missions
- 15. We recommend that the Executive Director's salary be set at \$44,000. Along with all director's housing allowance set at \$24,000.

He's worth it

Fellowship is key to our relationships in life. Someone has said, "To dwell up above with those that we love, oh, that will be glory. To dwell down below with those that we know, now that's another story." Philippians 3:10 says, "My goal is to know Him and the power of His resurrection and the fellowship of His sufferings, being conformed to His death." The key to understanding this verse is the word fellowship. It is a sense of closeness to God and the intimacy we can experience with Him. Jesus is worth the effort to know Him better!

This passage can be broken down into four parts. First, it's personal! "That I may know Him." We can easily fall into the trap of being more focused what we "do" for Christ rather than "who" we are in Him. "Doing" is marking things off of our to-do list, but being in Christ transforms our lives. Second, it's powerful! "The power of His resurrection." Many think that God doesn't place more on us than we can handle although, actually, He may. But, He never places more on us than HE can handle. We are able to do all things through Christ who strengthens us!

Third, it's painful! "The fellowship of His suffering." Paul considered it a privilege to be able to suffer for Christ. He courageously declared from prison that to live was Christ and to die was gain. It is not always easy to follow Christ, but He is worth it. Fourth, it's practical! "Being conformed to His death." Every day you need to have a funeral for the flesh. Paul said, "I am crucified with Christ, nevertheless I live." Jesus said, "If any man come after me, let him deny himself, daily, take up his cross and follow me."

We must think in terms of relationship and not just in terms of information. We can readily see the historical facts of Christ's resurrection and His suffering, but these are spiritual truths that we need to grasp over and over again. Christ considered us worth the suffering and dying on the cross for us. He is worth whatever "suffering" or "sacrifices" we have to make. Jesus moved the disciples along a trajectory from "Come and See" to "Come and Die!" The reality is that the only reason we can have fellowship with Him is because He suffered for us!


Jesus' resurrection enables us to live by His power and His suffering allows us to live in His presence. You cannot separate the two! This biblical foundation allows us to build a philosophy of ministry that clearly states the following clearly:

1. He is worth whatever He asks us to do! Jesus did not die on the cross of Calvary for our comfort. Worship is giving God the worth He deserves in our praise and singing. It is saying with every fiber of our being that He is worth it. He is worth every sacrifice, everything it might cost us, and every loss that might occur. Paul says in Philippians 3, "Because of Him I have suffered all things and consider them filth, so that I might gain Christ." He is worth it!

2. The real goal of life is to know Christ! Sometimes

we think the object of life is to never suffer and to do all we can to avoid pain. Certainly, no one looks forward to pain, but we must remember that the only reason we can have fellowship with Him is because He suffered for us. After Paul stresses this lesson he says, "Therefore, all who are mature should think this way. And if you think differently about anything, God will reveal this also to you."

- 3. Real joy comes through us saying yes to the cross! There is a cost to joy. Jesus proved this principle in that He endured the cross for the joy set before Him. Saying yes to the cross means doing what you are supposed to do, when you are supposed to do it, whether you feel like it or not. Paul knew what it was like to experience persecution. Check out II Corinthians 4:7-10 where he declares that through his suffering the power of Christ was then evident.
- 4. You can trust Him with and in times of suffering! Christ is with us in and during the trials and tribulations of this life. He asks so little of us and gave His life so that we might have eternal life. Even in suffering you can trust Him...especially in times of suffering. Someone has said, "In happy moments, praise God! In difficult moments, seek God! In quiet moments, worship God! In painful moments, trust God! In every moment, thank God!"
 - 5. Is what I am living for worth Christ dying for? In



his first book (2:21), Peter says, "For you were called to this, because Christ also suffered for you." Jesus has a mission for His church and that involves more than nice buildings, great programs, and ice cream socials. Is you church passionately pursuing the lost so they might know Christ also? How can we sit around, seemingly unconcerned, while multitudes die without Christ facing eternal punishment in hell?

The real transformation in our lives comes from knowing Christ and the fellowship of His sufferings. A willingness to do whatever He asks. Actually, I like what Luke McCown recently said, "Jesus doesn't need Christians who are willing to go. He needs them to go." Talk is cheap but the time has come for churches to rise up and be who He intended us to be. God's plan of making disciples as described in His word will work if we will work His plan. There is no plan B! He is worth it!

Making everlasting *Smiles*

The meaning of "Everlasting Smiles" has taken on a new meaning for me since becoming personally involved with the Short Term Missions department of BMA Missions. I've had the priviledge to work with the Everlasting Smiles Shoebox ministry of Baptist Medical Missions Inc. (BMMI) For many years my daughters and I have had the joy of packing shoeboxes to send to our missionaries around the world. This year, I've seen the full impact of "the life of a shoebox" and how each one is used to not only bless the children that receive them, but to open the door the missionaries to have many new ministry friends

After you pack your Everlasting Smiles Shoebox, it comes to the BMA Missions Office where teams of teams of volunteers go through each box carefully to make sure that they have the correct items in them. The boxes are sorted and are placed into larger boxes to ship. We have limited space in our office warehouse, so the boxes are kept at a storage facility until shipping time. Shoeboxes are collected until Sept. 1. In Oct., BMMI rents a large cargo container and ships the shoeboxes to our missionaries around the world.

This year the shoeboxes were sent to the children of El Salvador and Jordan. I visited with our missionary in El Salvador just after he passed our boxes to children in villages and hospitals all over his country. He reported that many children came to get a shoebox and that they were able to tell them about Jesus and play with them. This opens a door for him to make further relationships with the children and their families

I've always wondered what it would be like to watch the faces of children who are receiving the gift of a shoebox. In February, I was blessed when God provided a way for BMA Missions Office Manager, Paige West and I to go to Jordan to help deliver the boxes.

The first day in Jordan, we had an event at the Zarqa Baptist Church. Many people came. Children flooded in the doors of the church. We had to ask parents to stand at the back and outside as the church filled with children of all ages. The student team from the church lead them in songs and worship. They played games and listened to a Bible story. BMA Missionary to Jordan, Pastor Sam Jordan, told us that 98 percent of the children there were Muslim. I watched in awe as the children listened and participated in the activities. We gave out about 400 shoeboxes that day. As we finished, I started watching a few children open their boxes and look at the things inside. They didn't take things out, but carefully put the top back on so as to protect the box from someone that might take it. They held them tightly as they left with huge

The next time we handed out boxes, we went into the desert near the Syrian boarder into a Bedouin community. As we pulled up, the people were waiting in the streets for us. We handed out boxes to many children at one camp and continued to the second camp. The children were waiting for us there also. They took us into a tent. When the tent was opened I was shocked to see that there was a classroom. The children piled in and sat on the floor with

their "desk" which was a small step stool. There were charts and worksheets covering the walls of the tent. School started in January for these students. Some of them were 10 years old but could not write their name. As a former teacher, I was so blessed by this ministry of the church. We gave out shoeboxes at the school and followed the children outside where they were huddled around their boxes. I realized why this ministry was given the name, "Everlasting Smiles."

Yes, when they open each present there were huge, happy smiles. But there was much more to this ministry than just smiles. A seed has been planted in the hearts of these children. The gospel of Christ was given an opportunity to grow in little hearts and minds. Those shoeboxes that cost us very little money, time and effort were the vehicles of an invaluable gift. They provide an opportunity for each child and their family to come to know Christ. And THAT'S the **Everlasting Smile!!**


I want to challenge you...

Interim President Randy Odom said, "Our ministry is only as good as our staff."

Charles Johnson, chairman of the board of trustees, told the staff, "In one sense, you are our employees and what you do is your job. But really what you do is a ministry."



Successful time management

eing like a pastor is like pushing marbles uphill by hand. Just the time you think you've got everything going in the right direction, they come tumbling down. A pastor friend of mine said, "Pastoring is why I like watching sports. At the end of the game, at least everything is settled." Pastors not only work at least forty hours a week, but they are also on call seven days a week including vacations. If you are having trouble managing your time, here are some suggestions that might help.

PERSONAL TIME MANAGEMENT

Like me, most pastors suffer from the need for approval. We want to be liked, appreciated, and thought of as a caring pastor. But for the sake of our sanity and the health of our homes, we need to set boundaries. To keep from feeling guilty, let your church know that you love them and want to minister to them, but that your family is just as important. Not more important, but just as important.

Don't be afraid to turn your phone off at mealtime. If it is important, they will leave a message. Afterwards, you can return the call and respond. Set a date night or family game time once

a week. Let your church know this date is nonnegotiable and that as soon as possible you will be available to their needs. Leave the church behind on vacation. As I look back, this is my biggest regret. If you are a solo pastor, ask a pastor friend to be available for funerals or hospital visits in your absence. With his permission, give your church his phone number for emergencies.

Attend your children's school activities. Remember they are church members too who need their pastor/father just as much as anyone else in the church. Schedule important dates for your family when they won't conflict with church obligations. For me, because I never knew where I would be at night, I missed birthdays until we decided to have birthday breakfasts complete with cake and ice cream. This has become such a cherished time that now my children are grown, we still celebrate that way. With a little patience and effort, you can be a great dad/father while being a successful pastor.

PROFESSIONAL TIME MANAGEMENT

Because the demands of ministry are many, you can feel overwhelmed with all your responsibilities. The key is to set your schedule ahead of time instead of letting the "fires" of ministry set your schedule. Here's how. Make a weekly to-do list. List everything you need to accomplish that week, then prioritize that list. Then do your best to stick to your schedule. Set a time for personal prayer and Bible study. If you're really busy, this time might be before your day starts or after it ends. You will never grow deeper than the time you spend in the Word.

Go off the grid for sermon preparation. It might mean getting out of the office, or notifying your secretary that you are in "do not disturb." Your greatest responsibility is your sermon, so treat it that way. Use your phone. Sometimes a call will mean just as much as a personal visit. Enlist others in the work of the ministry. By letting others help, you will not only train leaders, but you will ensure that your health holds up for the long haul.

Caleb's bold request

DATE: May 7, 2017 **TEXT:** Joshua 14:6-15

IOSHUA 14

Our lesson today focuses on the faith and boldness of Caleb. When the Israelites provoked God to wrath in the wilderness (Numbers 14) judgement was pronounced upon every Israelite with the exception of everyone under the age of 20, and also Joshua and Caleb.

Now, lots are being cast to determine the inheritance for the nine and one half tribes. Caleb and his heirs inherited Hebron. There were several factors in this blessing being conferred upon Caleb.

- 1. Caleb trusted God. (Numbers 13) The faith of the rest of the company of spies who went in to scout out Jericho, faltered, but Caleb's faith never wavered. All the rest brought back "an evil report: concerning the descendants of Anak in Jericho. But Caleb stood strong among them, saying, "''Let us go up at once, and possess it; for we are well able to overcome it." Numbers 13:30.
- 2. Caleb demonstrated through his faith, his great regard for God's promise. Faith says, "we cannot, but God can.. ." Caleb's words signaled to Israel. He was confident the "Anakim" or giants inhabiting Jericho, were no match for

the power of God.

- 3. Caleb's faith caused him to remember God's promise:
- 4. Caleb was aware of God's provision and blessing upon his life Joshua 14:10
- 5. Caleb's faith in God created a boldness within. Joshua 14:12 — "Now therefore, give me this mountain. . ."
- 6. Caleb and his heirs inherited Hebron because of his faith: Joshua 14;14

Caleb was not strong in his own flesh, nor was he boastful of his own strength, but his total trust was in God the Father.

The division of the land

DATE: May 14, 2017 **TEXT:** Joshua 18:1-10

Why did Joshua, after all the victories, and the promised possession of land as a result of God's covenant with Abraham, find himself chiding the remaining seven tribes, who were yet to arise and go possess their inheritance? Verse 3

Scholars have offered conjecture as to what was going on with these seven tribes.

- 1. They had become content with the abundance they had as a result of the spoils of victory over past conquests.
- 2. They may not have been excited about being a people scattered abroad, but were content to be together.
- 3. Perhaps the tribes of Judah and Joseph, who had already received their land, were generous in entertaining brethren yet unprovided for.
- 4. Taking possession of properties once controlled by the Canaanites would mean diligent, perhaps tiresome and painful work of rebuilding.

A SYMBOL FOR BELIEVERS TODAY

Could the affections of these seven tribes being turned away from their home in Canaan, serve as a picture of believers today. We sometimes get too comfortable here on earth and fail to set our affections on things above. Perhaps Paul had in mind, the lethargic spirit of these seven tribes when he admonished the church to: "Set your affection on things above, not on things on the earth." Colossians 3:2

The great old hymn, On Jordan's Stormy Banks, which we used to sing, projects that longing spirit for things above.

"Filled with delight my raptured soul would here no longer stay; Though Jordan's waves around me roll, fearless, I'd launch away.

I am bound for the promised land, I am for the promised land; O, who will come and go with me? I am bound for the promised land."

The writer of that hymn, Samuel Stennett, used Canaan as a metaphor of our heavenly abode. The seven tribes were not "casting a wishful eye." Are we?

May we as believers in Christ, never cease to look longingly to eternal bliss in glory with Christ our Lord.



The cities of refuge

DATE: May 21, 2017 **TEXT:** Joshua 10:1-9

THE CITIES

Cities of refuge were not established to protect a person, who intentionally caused the death of another, from revenge. Deuteronomy 19 explains the process.

The cities named in Joshua 20, were Kedesh, Shechem, Hebron, Bezer, Ramoth and Golan.

THE PROCEDURE

According to Deuteronomy 19, a hypothetical incident of accidental death is given. (i.e. a man cutting wood when his ax head flies off the handle and strikes a working cohort - verse 5) Such a person who accidentally kills another, can flee into a city of refuge and live. He is to remain in that city until the high priest in the city dies, then the one causing the unintentional death may return to his original home city.

But a man who intentionally kills another, then the elders of the city may send for him and have him delivered to the "avengers." verses 11-12

One cannot be convicted of a crime unless it is on the testimony of two or three witnesses. verse 15

If one brings false charges against another, after it has been verifies by investigation, the one bringing the false charges will receive the same sentence he intended for the one he falsely accused. verse 18-19. The result will be that others will be discouraged from committing false accusations. verse 20.

THE PICTURE

We see in the cities of refuge, a picture of Christ. Satan wants to destroy us, but we can run to Christ for refuge. An Israelite who committed the unintentional death, must flee to a city, but he could possibly be avenged before he could reach the city. Jesus meets us where we are and provides us with refuge — or everlasting life. He is our High Priest who died on the cross to save us. The blessed old hymn addresses the

"How firm a foundation, ye saints of the Lord, is laid for your faith, in His excellent Word!

What more can He say, than to you He hath said, who unto the Savior for refuge have fled?"

Joshua's final charge

DATE: May 28, 2017 **TEXT:** Joshua 24:1-28

Joshua was a bold, articulate, influential speaker and leader. He delivered a firm charge to the Israelites soon after he was chosen to be the successor to Moses. He charged the people saying that Moses was now dead -- so arise and go in and possess the land which the Father has already promised to them. Over and over again, Joshua commanded the Israelites to "be strong and courageous," and "The Lord will not fail you nor forsake you."

Now it is Joshua's final charge to the people. He delivered a strong message from the Lord, basically recapping their experiences all the way back to Abraham.

RECAPPING THE JOURNEY

He reminded them of the plagues He sent to engineer their escape from Egypt; Then came the Red Sea incident, where God rolled the waters back and the Israelites went across on dry ground, while Pharoah's army was drowned. He reminded them of His destroying the Amorites, the rescue from Balak, and the treacherous crossing of the Jordan, to go over into Jericho.

DELIVERING THE CHARGE

Joshua admonished the people to (1) Fear the Lord; (2) Put away Idols; (3) Follow his lead:

Joshua not only was a leader of the people, but the leader of his family. He surely knew that "as the home goes, so goes the nation." So he commanded them to choose whom they would serve, and made his famous declaration, "But as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord. Joshua 24:15.

Joshua gave the people a vivid description of God the Father saying He is holy and jealous, demanding total devotion. Joshua charged them to put away their idols, and turn their hearts to the Lord.

There may be dozens of factors in the fall of a nation, , but the greatest cause of national destruction is the destruction of the family. refusing to follow the Lord God, and turning worship to idols. Men, may we all say, in agreement with Joshua's declaration, when he said, "as for me and my house, we will serve the Lord."


