INSIDE Cames A. Henry Ten thousand sermons and still going strong

SULPHUR SPRINGS—How many preachers who have ministered throughout the 2,000 year church age can say they have preached 10,000 times?

Jimmy Henry, pastor of Caney, Pickton, near Sulphur Springs, has just become included in this elite group of preachers because on Jan. 26, 2020, he delivered his 10,000th sermon—a feat which has taken him 67 years.

"My son Mark, who is the superintendent for the Cypress-Fairbanks school district, calculated the amount of time it would take to preach 10,000 sermons if preaching every day," Jimmy said. "He said if one sermon was preached daily, it would take 27 years, 5 months and 17 days."

The special celebration at Caney Church was earmarked by a cake, provided by his church, bearing the words, "Happy 10,000th Sermon!" Henry was also presented with a plaque, which denoted his first sermon preached at First, Talco, Aug. 17, 1952, where his father, Bro. E.W. Henry was pastor. The sermon was "Samson and the Lion" taken from Judges 14:5-9. And his 10,000th—"The Cross Upon Which Jesus Died," 1 Corinthians 1:17-24 at Caney, where he has ministered for 21 years. A potluck dinner was served after the services.

His children, "Mark, Sherry Henry Hatcher and Debbie Henry Shelton were on hand to celebrate the occasion. Jimmy's and Bennie's oldest son, Michael, went to be with the Lord several years

The 10,000 sermons do not include Sunday school and training lessons taught or other classroom lessons.

Many former church members from his pastorates were present for the celebration as well.

"You were my inspiration of knowing our Lord and Savior," said Tracie McLemore of Princeton, Louisiana. "My heart is very happy now to see that you are still spreading the story of our God."


Bill and Sherry Fullenwider, who sat under Henry's preaching at First, Magnolia, Arkansas, were also in attendance.

What is genuine worship?

C.S. Lewis made this profound statement about a church service—He said, "The perfect church service would be one we were almost unaware of. Our attention would have been on God."

I believe such a statement perfectly pinpoints the problem with the church "worship wars" today. We have become completely engrossed in worship instruments, worship styles and worship philosophies, while totally ignoring the real thing that matters in worship—and that is to worship God the Father from the heart.

I was told of a concert, hosted by a large Dallas church years ago. The famous Christian group, "First Call" performed their beautiful, a cappella hit, "O Sifuni Mungu," a worship song in the Swahili language. A church group became offended and walked out of the building because they thought it was a charismatic group singing in "unknown tongues" even though some English lyrics were interwoven into the song. Just a wild guess—I would assume the group that left had hearts totally void of a spirit of true

Now, I do have my preferences when it comes to worship style. I still favor the hymnal, pipe organ and piano—and a great choir that sings four-part harmony and a guy up front who waves his arm. But that's me. Others can worship when accompanied by tambourines, electric guitars and drums.

Instruments, style and philosophy are not synonymous with heart-felt worship!

Just ask Paul and Silas, who found themselves, possibly hours from execution, sitting in a dingy, cold jail cell—at midnight, singing praises to God.

Just ask Moses, standing by a dried up, ugly old bush on fire in the desert who had an incredible confrontation with God.

Just ask the Ethopian eunuch, who, after hearing a heart-stirring message from Deacon Phillip, received Christ, and, after the Spirit caught Phillip away, the Eunuch "went on his way rejoicing."

Just ask David who was overcome with worship after the Lord blessed the house of Obededom because of the Ark of God. When the company that was carrying the Ark had gone six steps, and as David made the sacrifice of oxen and fallings, he "danced before the Lord with all his might. . ." (2 Samuel 6:14).

Just ask Abraham whose expression of worship included

sacrificing his only son Isaac on the altar.

How does one worship? In Old Testament times, an integral part of worship was to bring burnt offerings and sacrifices, as an expression of worship. Today, we bring the sacrifice of ourselves before the Lord, and offer that, along with everything in our possession to Him (Romans 12:1).

To worship is to acknowledge from the heart that the Lord is worthy to receive glory (Revelation 4:11). The people of Israel rose up and worshipped at the sight of the pillar of cloud in Exodus 33:9-10. To genuinely worship is to acknowledge that the life inside you is not yours, but rather Christ Who lives in you (Galatians 2:20).

Worship is a lifestyle—not some contrived motions we go through during a Sunday service. What did Jesus do in Gethsemene, the night before He was to give His life on Calvary? He spent it in worship and calling out to the Father. It was a worship so intense, droplets of blood mixed with sweat beaded up on His head. Even as His physical life was fading away, he was still worshiping—and doing business for the Father. He was superintending the future well-being and care of His mother: He took time to save the lost sinner hanging on a cross next to Himwhile at the same time making Himself the ransom for the sins of the whole world

I'm sorry, but in all of these instances of worship, it doesn't seem that there was any concern about guitars, or tambourines, or pipe organs, or hymnals or giant screens. When worship is absolutely genuine, all those things fade into oblivion.

AS C.S. LEWIS ONCE SAID, "I WANT TO KNOW THE SPIRIT OF WORSHIP THAT MADE DAVID DANCE."

I'll add to that—I want to know the spirit of worship that made the eunuch leap for joy; I want to know the spirit of Solomon who lifted his hands toward heaven and said, "O Lord, God of Israel, there is no God like you. . ." I want to have the spirit of the woman with the Alabaster Box who brought her most prized possession and poured it out as an expression of love and worship to Christ. I want to have the spirit the widow had when she brought her meager amount to the altar of God - it was all she had—but Jesus said her heart revealed that she gave the most.

no matter how dark it gets

Looking out the back door, our frightened four-year-old said: "Hear that noise Daddy? It's the dark!" In an effort to calm John's fears, Coy explained that the "dark" was harmless and that the noise came from some little bugs called crickets. John wasn't buying into that story so Daddy went outside and retrieved a cricket for this important show and tell moment. While he didn't totally understand, John trusted his daddy and everything was okay.

All of us have experienced "dark" times that have nothing to do with the setting of the sun and the evening shadows that follow. Unlike John's fear, I'm talking about an invasion of the heart where the "dark" swoops in, gobbles up our joy and replaces it with paralyzing fear.

That's what happened to Joseph. Life was good for this 17-yearold and his future looked bright. It was no secret that he was his father's favorite which may have caused the deep divide between him and his brothers. Then came those strange dreams which clearly placed him at the top of the clan ruling over the entire family. If he had just kept quiet his brothers might have remained at the envy and jealousy stage. But sharing his dreams moved the needle up to unbridled anger and rage which culminated in a plot to kill young Joseph.

This story is recorded in Genesis 37-50 but here's a brief summary. On impulse Joseph's brothers threw him into an empty pit; on second thought they pulled him out of the pit and sold him to an Ishmaelite caravan so his blood would not be on their hands. Twenty-two years later they were forced to face the stark reality that their very lives depended on Joseph's forgiveness and mercy.

A lot of unfair stuff happened to him. He suffered undeserved pain and abuse from his brothers only to fall prey to the wicked wife of Potiphar in Egypt. From an empty well to a prison cell, his heart must have been broken and his spirit crushed as the "dark" chased him from one deep pit to the next. In spite of his circumstances, Joseph never succumbed to desperate, hopeless fear and never allowed bitterness to take root. Even when it was his turn for payback, his response was: No worries! It wasn't you who sent me to Egypt. It was God!

Genesis 45:5 (my summary).

It's true. We all have our own personal "pits" and sometimes the "dark" chases us to the very brink, threatening to knock us down. Next time that happens, remember Joseph and the truths that kept him strona:

The steadfast love of the Lord never ends and

God's plan for us will always be realized . . . no matter how dark

Genesis 39:21 and Genesis 50:20 (my summary).

Barna Research (barna.com) reports that fifty percent of pastors feel pressured when speaking out on controversial issues, fearing their people will take offense. While I doubt that is a problem among BMA pastors, I do feel we must be careful in how we present the truth of Scripture. The goal of effective preaching is to elicit a positive response, not turn people off. Here are six steps that guide me when I preach on unpopular

Bathe the issue in prayer. I believe one of the reasons Jesus spent so much time in prayer is that His preaching/teaching ran contrary to mainline religion. Having the heart and favor of the Father is always essential for preachers, but when dealing with difficult subjects, it is crucial that we know His power and wisdom are resting on us. When we pray, we must not only pray for ourselves but for those who will hear God's Word - that it will find a lodging place in the hearts of the hearers (Matthew 17:20-21).

Conduct a thorough investigation of Scripture. The real power of effective preaching doesn't come from the words of the preacher but the Word of God. By studying all the available scripture on a subject, you can deliver the whole counsel of God, along with preparing yourself for any questions. Even for the hardest heart, it's difficult to oppose an abundance of passages that refute bad doctrine.

Gather nonbiblical support. While the Bible should always be the primary focus, try including secular data as a way of illustrating the dangers of opposing viewpoints for those in your congregation who may not have high regard for Scripture or who rely on emotions. For example, when preaching on the biblical prohibition of sex outside of marriage, the Center for Disease Control (CDC) reports that *millions* of new cases of sexually transmitted diseases are reported each year (https:// www.cdc.gov/std/general/default.htm).

Speak the truth in love. Strong preaching touches the heart as well as the mind. I've found that if people know that I genuinely love them and want God's best for their lives, they give an honest hearing to God's Word. When our state legislators wrestled with the definition of marriage, I preached a three-part sermon on why I believe in the biblical definition of marriage: one man and one woman for life.

The second part of the series was against homosexuality. Word quickly spread through our small town, and I received a phone call from the leader of the gay community that they would be in attendance. In response, I shared two things with them: that they don't disrupt our services or they would be asked to leave, and that whatever I said would be in love. After the service, they said they kept their word because I kept my word. One of the men even asked for help in breaking free from that lifestyle.

Provide hope and help. Every message should demand a response. In other words, more than telling them that they need to change or giving information, we must show them how change is possible. For example, Barna Research reports that pornography is the number one sexual sin among Christians. At the end of the service, I directed those who struggle with this addiction to visit the website www.xxxchurch.com – a Christian organization who helps people with this problem. I also provided a list of licensed counselors that I had personally vetted.

Don't beat a dead horse. Once I cover a subject thoroughly, I move on to another topic. Nothing will frustrate and irritate your congregation more than constantly revisiting a subject. Our job as pastors is to give them all of God's Word, not just one portion of it. Help your people flourish by feeding them a healthy diet-God's complete Word.

Chris Freeman is from Laurel, Mississippi. He is married to Megan, and they have three boys-Isaac (13), Luke (10), and Seth (6). Chaplain Freeman has previously been enlisted in both the Mississippi Army National Guard and the United States Air Force and deployed in support of Operation Enduring Freedom to Afghanistan in 2003. After an eight-year military career, he was honorably discharged in 2005.

He was licensed and ordained into the Gospel Ministry by Pine Ridge, Laurel, Mississippi and has served in several BMA churches over the last 15 years. Throughout the years, Chaplain Freeman has struggled with his own Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder from his time in service but has managed to keep the faith. He prayed he would one day return to active duty as a chaplain to help other soldiers navigate the pitfalls of military life.

Chaplain Freeman earned an Associates in Bible from Southeastern Baptist College, a Bachelor in Religion and Business, and a Master of Divinity from Liberty University. After

gaining the education and experience necessary to become a military chaplain, Chaplain Freeman was unable to do so due to the severity of his PTSD symptoms. That is when a friend told him about the Mississippi State Guard. The Mississippi State Guard is the State Defense Force of Mississippi, and it falls under the Mississippi Military Department, along with the Mississippi Army National Guard and the Air National Guard.

The State Guard is trained to respond to natural and man-made emergencies around the state and to augment the National Guard as needed. The State Guard is made up of volunteers from around the State—doctors, lawyers, chaplains, police officers, firemen, and others—coming together to serve their state and communities. The State Guard is non-deployable outside the boarders of the United States. Chaplain Freeman sees the State Guard as a great opportunity to continue serving the Lord and serving his home state and community while ministering to the spiritual needs of the volunteer soldiers serving alongside him.



It is this adoption into God's family that has made all other adoptions possible.

As believers in Jesus, we are all blood brothers and sisters adopted by God. This bond should make us family; playing together, expecting to be frustrated with one another sometimes, and when we are hurt by another, we forgive each other. This is the family of God.

So, commit to turning to our blood relatives in church and ask "How are you? What are your biggest challenges in life right now? How can I be praying for you?" SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSONS

The Church Instructed

DATE: March 1, 2020 **TEXT:** Acts 1:1-11

THE HOOK

Luke is the writer of Acts, and the "former treatise" in Acts 1:1 is in reference to the Gospel of Luke. Theolopolis (lover of God) is likely a specific person to whom Luke is writing, but yet others believe he could be addressing all who love God. In our lesson text today, Luke is reviewing the material he wrote concerning the events just after the crucifixion.

THE BOOK

1. He appeared in the glorified body (verse 3). For 40 days after He was resurrected from the grave, Jesus presented Himself to different people. Even though His resurrection was the most earthshaking, glorious event to ever happen on earth, those followers of Christ were sorrowful, because this, their hopes for the coming Kingdom seemed to be dashed. Little did they realize Christ's death on the cross was not defeat, but victory

- 2. He revealed the coming of the Holy Spirit's empowerment (verses 4-5). They obviously remembered the prophecy in Joel, concerning the descent of the Holy Spirit.
- 3. He promised to set up His Kingdom (verse 6). But that would not happen until years later after Christ make His descent upon the earth at the end of the Tribulation, to set up His rule on earth (Revelation 20:1-3). But Jesus let that remain a mystery to them (verse 7).
- 4. He explained the sphere of their mission after empowerment by the Holy Spirit (verse 8). They were to spread the gospel message locally (Jerusalem) regionally (Judea and Samaria) and throughout the world.
- 5. He was caught up to return to His Father (verse 9). Two angels who were standing by, revealed to them that this was the same manner in which Christ would return one day.

THE LOOK

Verse 8 reveals that the Spirit's empowerment was essential to reach out to the world with the gospel. That power and authority has been bestowed upon the New Testament Church no other para-church organization or individual outside the auspices of the church has the authority, nor the power.

The Church in Jerusalem Empowered

DATE: March 15, 2020 **TEXT:** Acts 2:1-13

THE HOOK

Most every child of God has been privileged to be in a church gathering when God the Father moved in a way that was inexplicable. When He moves among us, there is no logical, human explanation. There is no energy of the flesh that can claim responsibility. This is what happened in Jerusalem as we see in our scripture today.

1. The Spirit's descent was sudden (verse 2). When

the Holy Spirit decides to descend, He does it without warning. But preparation had already been made; Jesus apprised the people of the coming events and they were told to tarry in Jerusalem and wait.

- 2. The evidence was unmistakable. Cloven tongues of fire appeared to be upon each individual; there were supernatural happenings, including 19 different dialects that were represented, heard the gospel in his or her own native language, It was not unknown tongues as the charismatic movement claims today. It was bonafide languages.
 - 3. Old Testament prophecy was fulfilled (verse 16;

Joel 2:28).

4. The cynics were bestirred. Anytime God does something which cannot be explained, cynics and skeptics always conjure up human logic. "These men are full of new wine" (verse 13).

THE LOOK

While these particular sign gifts seem to have ceased of themselves in the advent of the completed canon (1 Corinthians 13:10) we need not lapse into an opinion that God is not capable of moving among us as He did in those days. God is sovereign and He is powerful.

Life-changing Repentance

DATE: March 15, 2020 **TEXT:** Acts 2:37-47

THE HOOK

God the Father can use the most unlikely means—use the most unlikely people to accomplish His work. The Apostle Peter was one such unlikely person. Just 50 days earlier, he denied to accusers that he was associated with Christsomething Christ told him he would do. Yet, here is that same Apostle Peter, standing in the midst of this throng of people, preaching with great power and authority.

- 1. The message penetrated hearts (verses 37-40). One Bible version says, "cut to the quick," "pierced" like a thorn jabbed into a foot, or a needle lancing a boil. Such is the drawing power of the Holy Spirit on a convicted life.
- 2. The message brought about results (verse 41). When the power of God is manifest, people come to Christ. The Word accomplishes its purpose (Isaiah 55:11).
- 3. The people became established in the Word (verse 42). They were faithful to the word, they dwelt together in one accord; they shared with their brothers and sisters in Christ; worshipped together, shared in the Lord's Supper and

4. The Lord increased their number (verse 47). Churches have gone to seed on "church growth principles" but scripture teaches that it is God the Father Who brings the increase (Matthew 16:18).

God's Kingdom is enlarged as God's Word is preached; the people abide in the doctrines of that Word; and make themselves available for ministry within the framework of the New Testament Church.

Hope for the Helpless

DATE: March 22, 2020 **TEXT:** Acts 3:1-10

THE HOOK

When I was pastor in Nacogdoches, it seemed that everyone traveling from Detroit to Houston ran out of gas right in front of my church. And they were all penniless. If we were able, we would give them fuel, purchase some essentials for their trip, realizing all the while, that while some were sincerely in need, others were professional "panhandlers." It once irritated me to consider the unmitigated gall of panhandlers to come and try to acquire that which was mine. But God has convicted me of that, letting me know, in no uncertain terms, that He would repay me. Proverbs 19:17 The issue was not to try to protect my money and

belongings, but to be obedient to God. Our spirit for giving should always be with the motive of providing something money cannot buy—like directing people to Christ and eternal life.

THE BOOK

- 1. The cripple man, begging alms probably knew he was in the right place since he was near the architecturally ornate and beautiful temple. People needing help tend to gravitate to the house of God (verse 2).
- 2. The men representing God, Peter and John, were obviously not men of means, themselves (verses 3-5). Often men of God have inadequate means to help the downtrodden. I thank God for permitting me to be pastor of a caring church that makes some provisions to

help those who are in need.

- 3. Peter and John were short on temporal things, but they offered the lame man something which money could not buy—and since he was praising God in verse 8, we are to assume that he received more than just the ability to walk, but to have a new found relationship with Christ.
- 4. When God does a miraculous work in the life of such a man, others take notice (verse 9). When we reach out to someone in the name of Jesus, we never know what the results might be.

THE LOOK

When we reach out to one, we can be confident God will use it to touch others.

Opportune Moments to Share the Gospel

DATE: March 29, 2020 TEXT: Acts 3:11-26

THE HOOK

Isn't it frustrating when people of the community become enamored with the church's food drive-or fall festival-or the Friday night after game fellowship for high schoolers, and do not get the message that it is the love of a Holy God that we seek to present?

That sometimes happens when we cease upon those "opportune moments to share the gospel."

THE BOOK

- 1. The people mistook the miracle of the raising of the lame man as being a result of human power (verse 12).
- 2. The people failed to realize through the miracle, who Jesus was. Peter intended for them to finally realize Who the One was they crucified (verse 13).
- 3. The people failed to understand that they chose a common criminal, Barabbas to live instead of the King of kings and Lord of lords (verses 14-16).
- 4. Peter, who directed the message to the men of Israel, expressed disappointment that the Jews present, had missed Old Testament prophecy of the crucifixion (verses 17-18).
- 5. Peter implored the crowd to repent, promising that they would be forgiven (verse 19).
- 6. Peter promised the return of Christ, in reference to His second advent, returning to earth with His people, to set up

His Kingdom to rule for 1,000 years (verses 20-21).

7. Peter used the Old Testament to explain to the unbelieving Jews that the same message about the prophet being raised up was told by Samuel and the rest of the prophets, even back to God's covenant with Abraham. So, the message was not new, and should have been remembered by the Judaziers in the book of Acts. 23-26.

THE LOOK

Even when a people are guilty of such heinous sins as the Jews were, the truth is, God is merciful, long-suffering, and His grace was still extended. That same grace is available to all who will come to the cross.

Encampment in 1962 when I was saved," Sherry said. "He later became our pastor when I was a senior in high school. He married Bill and me 50 years ago."

Henry recalled the service at the national encampment, which was held at Latham Springs near Hillsboro, when he surrendered to preach in August, 1951.

"I was sitting next to my best friend, Grady Nutt, and Harold Brunson was preaching that night," Henry recalled. "There were over 100 professions of faith and eight young men surrendered to preach that night.'

He asked his friend, Grady Nutt, to go out under the trees and pray with him just before the service because he felt strongly that God was calling him to preach.

"I stood up in front of the crowd after the invitation, and just said, "I'm Jimmy Henry—I'm a senior in high school, and I'm surrendering to preach," he said.

When he was 18 years old, Henry accepted his first pastorate—Pleasant Grove, Pickton, which he said is just a mile down the road from where he is pastor today.

His second pastorate was Jackson, Canton, during which time he and Bennie, a native of Springhill, Louisiana, were united in marriage in 1954. The couple commuted to Canton while attending Jacksonville College.

While at Caney, Streetman, which was his third pastorate, Jimmy commuted to Baylor University where he received his bachelor degree.

"I attended Baylor with my friends Edwin Crank, Harold (Smiley) Burns, Randall Reddin, and Bobby Thornton," he said, noting that there was one class in which they all attended together.

He later attended the BMA Seminary in Jacksonville, and received his masters degree from Ouachita Baptist University in Arkadelphia, Arkansas.

Other pastorates included Calvary, Fairfield, (1957-61) Immanuel, Camden, Arkansas, (1961-64) First, Jacksonville, (1964-66) First, Magnolia, Arkansas (1966-79). From 1979, his ministry included Central, Lubbock, Oak Park, Lubbock and Bryan Street, Lamesa. From there, he became the director of the Ministers Benefit Department for the BMA of America, located in Texarkana. Afterward, he accepted Hillcrest, Texarkana, and for the past 21 years, he has served Caney, Pickton.

Among his ministry opportunities, Henry has served as president of the Baptist Missionary Association of America. He taught in Columbia Bible School in Magnolia, as well as some classes at the BMA Seminary in Jacksonville. Three times had been approached about being president of the seminary, but declined, saying he did not feel called to that work. He has authored more than a dozen books.

When asked to list some of his heroes of the faith, he cited L.H. Raney, W.J. Dorman, Gerald Keller, Harold Brunson, Jack Bloxom, C.R. Meadows, Tommy Hall, Tommy Guthrie and James Schaffer.

"Bro. Raney was my Dad's pastor at Farley Street, Waxahachie," Henry said. "Dad was a deacon in the church, and fought the call to preach—that is, until the Lord burned his bakery down."

In response to the question about a high point in his ministry through the years, he replied, "I would have to say that this service last Sunday would be hard to surpass."
