he 2017 BMA of America Meeting began with congregational worship and a worshipful performance by Jacksonville College Choir May 1. Following the choir, Dr. Jack Graham, pastor of Prestonwood, Plano, preached using the theme of the meeting, Brick by Brick

PETITIONING CHURCHES

Petitioning churches including Grace Hills, Bentonville, Arkansas; Olde Tyme, Gilmer; The Bridge, Mountain Home, Arkansas; and The Refuge, Terrell were accepted into the BMA of America.

DISCIPLEGUIDE CHURCH RESOURCES

Dr. Scott Attebery, executive director of DiscipleGuide spoke of the updated format for Compass curriculum that debuted in the winter of 2016. He said, "After two years of development, the launch was successful and has received positive reviews from our churches." He noted that the new Compass Commentary edition was created for classes who enjoy a more traditional format. Now churches can choose between fill-in-the-blanks and discussion questions, and a traditional lecture format with

Because of the positive reception, DiscipleGuide is considering future additions to their curriculum line.

Speaking about conferences offered by DiscipleGuide, Attebery shared that the SOAR student conference will take place at the Gaylord Texan in Grapevine July 5-7, 2017. He also introduced plans for a Church Leaders Cruise that will be January 13-18. The cruise will be for pastors, student ministers, children's ministers and other church staff and will take the place of Pastors Oasis.

The annual Senior Adult Conference will be Nov. 13-15 at the Hilton Convention Center Hotel in Branson, Missouri, and will feature Don Chandler, pastor of Central, Conway; vocalist, Steve Green; and a special Christmas show at the Sight and Sound Theater.

Attebery promoted Activate, a consulting ministry led by Todd West that provides coaching to church leaders.

Speaking about Daniel Springs Camp, Attebery noted it is currently experiencing financial difficulties, and he called on churches to support the ministry. A special study will be conducted over the next year by the Coordinating Council on how best to manage the camp and hopefully improve its financial condition. Attebery gave high praise to Camp Director Jason Prewitt saying that he has worked diligently to create a camp that our churches can be proud of.

BMA THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

In his report for the BMA Theological Seminary, President Charley Holmes, spoke of how the seminary has grown from an enrollment of just under 70 in 1997 to 170 today. The seminary's budget has also increased from that time from \$500,000 to \$1,500,000 today. Goals for the future include 60 new students in the coming year, \$60,000 to refurbish the Dorman Memorial Chapel and the Gregson Center, and \$60,000 to be added to the building fund for needed repairs. The BMA __ Dr. Charley Holmes Seminary Dinner this year did not include



a Kellar Award recipient, but emphasis was placed on the seminary's 60 years of ministry. Former Kellar Award recipients, Grady Higgs and Buddy Johnson, shared testimonies of their time at the school.

LIFEWORD

Outgoing Lifeword Media Ministries Executive Director Steve Crawley shared how over 50 new community radio stations have been started in the past year by Lifeword. Now, 2 billion people worldwide can hear Lifeword broadcasts. One-fourth of the world is now reached by Lifeword Media Ministries. In the past year, four new languages have been added to their broadcast lineup.

Following the report by Crawley, Donny Parrish, who was elected as the new executive

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President's Message Brick by Brick: Working Together

an we make a difference? There are thousands all around the world who would answer this question with a resounding "yes." In fact, I am living proof that the BMAA does make a difference. How about

Helen Keller said, "Alone, we can do so little; together, we can do so much." Brick by Brick-Working Together is the theme for this year's meeting, and our text is Neh. 3:1-32.

Nehemiah 3 is one of those chapters that consists largely of unpronounceable names and long forgotten people! It can be discouraging to come to a chapter like this, and sometimes we are tempted to skip over them and move on to the next one. After all, there couldn't be much to be gained from a chapter like that, right? Wrong! If we did that with Nehemiah 3, we would miss some powerful and valuable lessons on building

We have tried to give each person present a piece of a puzzle. My son, Chad, used this illustration in one of his sermons, and I have borrowed it for today. You see, fitting into the big picture is somewhat like an individual piece of a puzzle.

Have you ever tried to put together a jigsaw puzzle? Some of them, like the 1,000 piece ones, can be challenging. What makes them so difficult is that the tiny pieces don't look like much of anything by themselves. They are small, oddly colored and oddly shaped. When you pick up a piece of the puzzle, then look at the box and look back at the tiny piece in your hand, you think "There is no way this is a part of that."

However, as you put each piece in its place, before long, a picture begins to emerge. Soon you realize that your tiny, misshaped piece was a vital part of a grand design.

I want to back up for a moment to Neh. 2:18 where we find nine powerful words: "...so they strengthened their hands for this good work." The key to their success in rebuilding the wall was based on the pronoun "they."

While it has been said that great works for God depend upon great leadership, but in Nehemiah, we can clearly see that great works for God also depend upon great follow-ship because, without follow-ship, leadership does not exist. That is where each of us comes in

This association is not an organization of superstars and mega churches. It is a team that depends on the willingness of all its members to see the good things our leaders set before us, then work to accomplish them. God has blessed us with Godly leaders that we, as an association of churches, have placed in key positions to bring structure and organization to our

Throughout His Word, God has blessed those who work together in unity. A definition of unity is this: "followers, working side-by-side with other followers."

While building Liberty Memorial Baptist Church in Memphis, two hired hands got upset with one another over something that wouldn't amount to a hill of beans. I came into the building and saw each of them trying to do a twoman job alone. Their indifference resulted in wasted time and productivity. They had temporally forgotten our purpose — to build a building. Needless to say, after we had a short "go to Jesus meeting," unity was restored at the building site.

Whether we agree on everything is not important as

long as we agree on our purpose. Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant said, "In order to have a winner, the team must have a feeling of unity. Every player must put the team first—ahead of personal glory."

That is why the success of our association, or any association today, depends upon a "sideby-side" mentality. It is coming together in purpose that turns our weak birdshot into powerful buckshot! Great teamwork makes

things happen more than anything else in an organizationmore than skill, qualifications or money.

I used to hate working all day, then rushing to the ballpark only to find that we had to forfeit because of a lack of team members. Uncaring people on a team remind me of two guys in a sinking boat, sitting together at one end doing nothing while the people at the other end are bailing furiously. One said, "Thank God that hole isn't in our end of the boat." I wish we would keep in mind that our lack of involvement leaves others vulnerable

Sometimes we, as team members, are called on to sacrifice our time, effort, comfort and even our own desires for the sake of the team. The team's success must always be of greater value than our individual interests. When everyone adds their piece of the wall, (their piece of the puzzle) then, and only then, can the work be completed.

Just imagine, dare to envision, what our association would look like if all of us simply built our portion of the wall and did what we could to help the team! But being followers sometimes goes against our nature. That is why great followers sometimes find themselves doing what they are not used to doing, for the good of the body.

Our text tells us that when someone finished their portion of the wall, they immediately moved over to help those next to them. Even in the presence of opposition and negativity, they remained faithful to the team and the team's cause.

I have always loved Nehemiah's answer to those who were against him and the good work that was being done: "...I am doing a great work, so that I cannot come down: why should the work cease, whilst I leave it, and come down to you?" (Neh.

A few years back in one of our Coordinating Council meetings, Dr. Steve Crawley used a term I thought for sure he must have made up—synergy. Then I discovered that synergy occurs when combining forces produces better results than individual effort. When each of us does our part, amazing things begin to happen. That is what we saw taking place in the rebuilding of the wall. Teamwork produced a greater outcome than going solo. In other words, 1 + 1 = 3! Here's a simple illustration of what I mean:

Person A is too short to reach an apple on a tree, and so is Person B. But when Person B sits on the shoulders of Person A, they are more than tall enough to reach the apples and both of

I couldn't believe my eyes! There it was in bold print on my birth certificate: "stillborn!" What? I had been told my birth was difficult and that I weighed only 4 and one-half pounds, but stillborn? I don't think so!

When this shocking news surfaced, Mama was already in heaven so I asked Daddy to share the details and this was his story. "The doctor couldn't get you to breathe, so he pronounced you dead and apologized as he left the room." Daddy went on to say, "your mama would have none of it and said 'Johnnie, bring that baby to me. I've already lost two and I'm not losing this one!" And she didn't! Laying me face down on her chest, she pressed and rubbed my tiny body, begging God to give life. And He did! She was there when I was born.

Eleven years later, **she was there when I was 'born again' into the family of God.** It happened in a revival meeting in the Prairie Valley Baptist Church near Snyder, Okla. When the invitation began, I started down the aisle and Mama met me in the altar. With her by my side, we knelt and prayed as I asked Jesus to be my Savior.

For 18 years she was there for me... sharing truth and **teaching life lessons.** Sometimes she spoke words; more often she lived out her convictions in front of me. Mama wanted to help everyone so we took food, gave hugs and prayed. At that young age, I hated being with sad people so I suggested we let them grieve alone and pray at home. She never responded harshly to my childish theories. But we kept going, and I kept marching right up to the front door with a covered dish in my hands. She believed the Bible and was determined I should follow it. Here's a sample of truth she wanted me to know and learn to live by:

- Put God first and everything else will work out.
- God's Word is true and tells us how to live.
- Find ways to help someone else and you will be happy.
- Who you are on the inside is more important than how you look on the outside.
- Jesus is coming soon. Be ready!

When I was in college about to celebrate my 18th birthday, Mama sent money for a new Bible, telling me to "buy it through our book store because a portion of that sale goes to mission work." She was there when I **learned to love missionaries**—a love which remains today.

I'm grateful my mama, Serrintha West Kenmore, was there when I was born and didn't give up when I couldn't breathe. I am blessed she spent the rest of her life pouring love and truth into my heart and mind. Now it's my turn! Yours too! No matter the age—no matter the season—someone we know needs a hug, a listening ear and God's Word. This month The Heart Connection salutes all moms because you truly are "far more precious"

Joe and Mira Costa, an incredible inspiration

"Joe and Mira Costa are an incredible inspiration. They both have fathers who have spent their lives in ministry in the Middle East, and now Joe and Mira will continue that faithful service to the Lord as part of the BMA Missions team in that part of the world. We are excited to partner with this dedicated couple and journey with them in their ministry to reach the youth of the Middle East and to strengthen churches in that region." This is how Dr. John David Smith, executive director of BMA Missions, describes Joe and Mira, who will become missionaries to Lebanon in the near future

Joe Costa is the son of BMA Missionary Charlie Costa, who was commissioned in 1993 when Joe was only five years old. Joe says that living most of his life in the Middle East and being a part of that Arab culture has become an integral part of his life.

"As a family, we grew up with Arab traditions, doing everything like the local Lebanese people, so as a mission kid I felt like more of a local than anything else," Joe said.

One element that did differ in the Costa family was that they were heavily focused on serving people inside and outside of the church. He described living a life like many other pastors' children in that his routine was going to church, doing Bible studies, and going to youth group. At the age of sixteen, though, God began to call upon him to adopt a deeper, more real faith.

"I was talking to a friend, and he told me that I need to be friends with Jesus. Real friends. Not acquaintances," Joe recalled. "My attitude towards faith [now] is not because I am a missionary kid; that does not make me a real follower. My attitude towards faith has changed."

Several years later at the age of 21, God called Joe Costa into a life of full-time ministry, and then at the age of 28, he knew God was calling him to become a missionary to the youth of the Arab world.


Joe and Mira met at a youth ministry training conference in Lebanon. Both their fathers were pastors, and that helped them form a common bond. They dated several years, much of the time long-distance, because Mira came to the United States to get her master's degree.

"Long distance tested our relationship. It gave us an opportunity to pray for each other and focus on the spiritual part of our relationship. It had its difficulties, but it was nice. During that time, I knew she had a heart for young people in the Arab world, and that drew us closer together," said Joe.

They have been married since August 2016 and are living in the Dallas, Texas, area until September of this year, working on preparing for the move back to Lebanon. They

are currently serving in a BMA national missionary's Arabic church in Garland, Texas, helping with the youth group. They are also visiting churches, working to raise funds for their future ministry.

"We have 35 percent of our support raised, and still have



They are looking for people to sponsor their ministry monthly and create a continuance momentum that will help keep them supported on a monthly basis.

"This will give us the proper resources in terms of a work fund – a salary – so that we can go back to Lebanon fully funded and focus fully on the ministry. There are a lot of projects and plans that we want to do in Lebanon, Iraq, and Jordan, but we can't do it without monthly support," said Joe.

When they arrive on the mission field, the Costas have three "pillars" of ministry they are going to focus on. The first is working with youth pastors to train them in mentoring and discipling the younger generation. The second pillar is to work with churches and assess their needs, finding out how they can assist their ministry, especially their youth ministry. The third pillar will be working with Syrian refugees in Lebanon, starting small groups and youth groups for unbelievers and those who have questions about the Christian

"So these are the main three pillars," explained Joe. "In each one, there are a lot of ideas and things we want to do."

Joe and Mira Costa ask for your prayers. They ask for protection and wisdom as they approach their date to return to Lebanon. They ask you to pray that they would mature in the Lord, and also be in prayer for the young people in the Arab world. Finally, they request prayer for the Muslims in their home nation, that they would come to know Christ.

Seminary Summer Schedule Includes Free Online Preaching Course

ince 2000, the BMA Seminary has offered intensive week-long studies each summer that focus upon various areas of religious education. The 2017 summer schedule includes courses for both credit and non-credit students.

Non-credit students may be interested in auditing the seminary's DiscipleWay training June 12-15, 2017 on its main campus in Jacksonville, Texas. The training includes an introduction to the biblical, educational, and philosophical principles that undergird DiscipleWay curriculum, exposes individuals to each DiscipleWay discipline, and gives particular attention to the disciplines of Bible study and witnessing. DiscipleWay's goal is to teach individuals how to perform disciplines without the help of a teacher while also developing the ability for those same individuals to teach others without the help of a teacher.

Non-credit students may also be interested in the seminary's free online course in Oral Communication/Preaching course with Dr. Tony Cleaver. The study begins May 30 and ends July

Credit seeking students can enroll in both on campus, online, and hybrid courses. Students may enroll in an appropriate level of DiscipleWay training on campus with Drs. Philip Attebery, David Hellwig, and Ronnie Johnson June 12-16. Online students may enroll in Church Administration with Dr. Mark Livingston, Greek Appreciation with Dr. Gary O'Neal, or New Testament Interpretation: Gospel of John with Dr. David Hellwig (May 30-July 25), and a hybrid course in Sermon Preparation or Expository Preaching with Dr. Charley Holmes (July 17-19).

Deadline for registration is May 12, 2017. All courses may be taken at reduced costs for non-credit. Students interested in DiscipleWay training without credit may register until May 30,

very human being wants to know, "Who am I?" and "How should I live?"



While at Gary, the Builders attended worship services at Bethel, Clayton. The Master's Builders helped in the construction of Bethel Baptist in September 2015 and the

members at Bethel have always been such a blessing to the group. The Builders enjoyed two meals and lots of wonderful fellowship with the great folks at Bethel during this job.

The Master's Builders plan to be at Jacksonville College in Jacksonville May 8, and then on to Summers Baptist Church in Summers Ark on June 5

An update on Bro. Marvin Clack's health condition

any of you read in the Jan. 16, 2016 edition of Baptist Progress how Bro. Marvin Clack became completely paralyzed from the waist down on Sept. 8, 2015. Bro. Marvin has served as a state missionary for four years and pastor for 37 years with various missions/churches in Gun Barrel, Sunnyvale in Pleasant Grove, and First Baptist at St. Elmo. Bro. Marvin has endured numerous surgeries to locate the blockage of blood in his spine including over 30 hours of surgery to prevent any further paralysis moving up his body. At that time, he was given only a five percent chance of recovery. He also has endured additional complications and blood clots in his leg and both lungs. After nine weeks in the hospital and six months in rehab, he was returned to the hospital for additional surgery. Unfortunately, any progress made during 2016 was lost after the last surgery.

Recently, Marvin's wife Janet has suffered heart problems due to her being the primary caregiver. As you can imagine, their financial resources have been depleted due to Marvin's medical bills. In addition, they have had to purchase a wheelchair accessible van and modify their home to allow wheelchair access for him.







Dealing with criticism

arly in my ministry, I was severely criticized by a high school English teacher on my command of the English language. The critic went on to say that I was an embarrassment to our church and should resign. Her rant lasted nearly thirty minutes. I was dumbfounded. I felt my stomach drop through the floor and the blood rush to my face. I felt ashamed, angry, upset, and confused. If not for my wife, I would have handed in my resignation the next Sunday.

Criticism can crush you. Preachers are criticized for just about everything. At one time or another, every preacher has heard, "Why did you let someone park in my spot. You misspelled a word in the handout. It's too hot (or cold) in here. You preached too long. You didn't attend the bladder suspension of my third cousin." The list of complaints a pastor receives are endless. Pastors, before throwing in the towel and walking away, here is how I learned to deal with criticism.

Expect it. Jesus was criticized. Are you above Christ?

As Jesus lists the Beatitudes in Matthew 5:1-12, He even guarantees that we will be persecuted. No matter how perfectly you do things, you cannot avoid criticism. Even if you do nothing, you will still be criticized.

Analyze it. Count to ten, take a deep breath, and settle down. Instead of reacting, try to understand the source of the criticism. Is the critic just having a bad day? Is it a personal preference? Is it realistic? Is it legitimate? Uncovering the truth will probably take time and prayer. Let your critics know you heard them, which is usually all they want anyway, and that you will get back with them.

Separate it. In other words, don't take it personally. Even if your character is called into question, you know who you are in Christ. Instead of having a pity party or feeling sorry for yourself, spend your time on the real issue.

Resolve it. Don't let it hang around. Problems that linger never go away. They only grow worse. Sit down with the critic and come up with a solution that works best for everyone. When you meet with a critic, always have someone one with you who can verify what took place.

Forget it. Once the problem has been dealt with – move on. Don't let it rob you of your joy, drain you of your energy, or slow down your momentum. Choosing how you react to criticism can make you bitter or better. As for me, when I was criticized about my use of the English language so I audited an English class at the local junior college and became better.

When you give to the project, your checks or letters must say, "State WMA Project Fund." You may give specific instructions for it to be divided between the project and general fund. If there are no instructions for your donations and offerings, all the money is put into the General Fund.

The General Fund is important for the operations of the State WMA. Each quarter your local auxiliary and district auxiliary should support the general fund to help supply the following: the cost of printing this Auxiliary page in Baptist Progress, salaries for the corresponding secretary, editor, and webmaster, other officer expenses including postage and mail-outs, phone calls, travel mileage, teaching aids, office supplies for the corresponding secretary and any other expense approved by the State Auxiliary. We pay speakers for the State meetings and Annual Ladies' Retreat and gifts for Miss/ Jr. Miss GMA at their State Meeting.

The General Fund is important for the Texas WMA to function and accomplish our goal of pleasing the Lord through our giving. The Youth Fund is available for the Sunbeam and GMA Promoters to use for expenses of their group's Annual meeting which includes mileage, postage, phone calls, teaching aids, decorations, etc. In 2 Corinthians 9:7, the apostle Paul writes, "Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity: for God loveth a cheerful giver." 

Meet Ephesians

By PAUL GAUNTT

DATE: June 4, 2017 **TEXT:** Ephesians 1:1-2

THE WRITER:

The Apostle Paul is the undisputed writer of the book of Ephesians. Scholars tell us that this book was a circular letter, delivered to several different churches. The church at Ephesus was Paul's longest pastorate, having spent about three years pouring his life and ministry into the church. Read Acts chapter 16 through 19 for a detailed account of Paul's ministry in Ephesus.

THE WRITER'S CREDENTIALS:

Notice the subdued nature of Paul's salutations in all his writing. Rather than introduce himself as Paul, the

once great leader of the Sanhedrin, educated by Gamaliel, he simply presents himself as an apostle of Jesus Christ. Elsewhere he refers to himself as a prisoner of Christ. He was not concerned with impressing anyone with his resume of greatness—he yielded all the glory and honor to his

THE WRITER'S BLESSING:

Paul wishes for Ephesus, as he does for all who received his letters, grace and peace, which can only come from God the Father, and His only begotten Son, Jesus Christ.

THE WRITING:

The first three chapters of Ephesians addresses positional truth—our position in Christ, and the sovereignty of God.

We have a thorough explanation of the doctrine of salvation —by grace, through faith—not of ourselves. (Chapter 2) We are inundated with information concerning all the riches that we have in Christ. (blessed with all spiritual blessings in the heavenlies) The latter three chapters deal with practical truth—how we ought to behave because of who we are in Christ. Someone once said that if we were to be taken over by a totalitarian government, which outlawed the Bible, but allowed us to keep one book from it, Ephesians would be the book to have. All Bible doctrine is represented in Ephesians—a clear, concise treatise on how the New Testament Church is to be governed, maintaining godly, earthly relationships, marriages, child-rearing, spiritual warfare and other vital issues of the Christian life. All of these are contained in this small but powerful book.

Experiencing God's grace brings gratitude

DATE: JUNE 11, 2017 **TEXT:** Ephesians 1:3-14

- 1. God's Grace brings blessings: verse 3 We commonly think of blessings as being tangible, earthly bounty and wellbeing. But blessings from God showered upon His people represent both terrestrial and celestial blessings. Literally, He blesses us with all spiritual blessings in the heavenlies. And every blessing comes from God and the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.
- 2. God's Grace means He has sovereignly selected us in Him from before the foundation of the world. (verse 4) Salvation is totally of Him. Man does not have the power in his flesh to declare himself spiritually alive - it can only be the quickening and drawing power of the grace of almighty God through Jesus Christ. That, and only that is what prompts man to call upon the name of the Lord. (John 6:37) Sometimes man recoils at such a doctrine because it removes all reason for him to glory in himself.
- 3. God's Grace means He has chosen us for His own good pleasure. (verse 5) Salvation is not for the purpose of giving us eternal fire insurance - it is for His divine purpose and pleasure. But eternal life in glory with Him is a wonderful
 - 4. God's Grace means He has conferred upon us His

wisdom and the ability to value knowledge. (verse 8)

- 5. God's Grace means He has saved us for His own purpose (verse 9)
- 6. God's Grace means He has made known the mystery of the ages, which He reveals in Ephesians 3:6 that the gentiles are made fellow heirs with the Jews. That truth was a mystery to the Old Testament prophets, but is now revealed to the church.
- 7. God's grace means security (verse 13-14) Paul uses two terms to emphasize this: The Holy Spirit's seal, which is illustrated by the king's signet issuing a proclamation. (Esther 8:8) King Ahasuerus proclamation established the Feast of Purim, celebrating Israel's victory over Haman. That proclamation was sealed in wax, and had the king's signet stamped in it, and it was irreversible. This is analogous to the sealing of the Holy Spirit on us

Paul also uses a real estate term — earnest - which means down payment. One pays down earnest money to secure a house deal. The Holy Spirit's seal is God's earnest — or down payment on our eternal life, and He will never renege on that promise. The word also denotes "engagement ring." As the Body of Christ, we are "engaged" to Christ, and one day that engagement will result in the great wedding feast.

And it is all "unto the praise of his glory." verse 14

Experiencing God's amazing grace

DATE: June 25, 2017 **TEXT:** Ephesians 2:1-9


Ephesians 2 gives the greatest, most concise description of salvation, the plan, purpose, and the benefits of salvation.

- 1. Through salvation, the dead are made alive . verse 1
- 2. It is God through His only begotten Son, Jesus Christ, who has made us alive spiritually, in Him. The lump of clay in the Garden of Eden had no way of making its' own life—only when the breath of Almighty God breathed into it, did it become a living soul.
 - 3. Through salvation, our lifestyle and desires change; verse 2
- 4. Before God quickened us through salvation, our desires and our behavior were completely driven by our own lusts. Selfgratification was our motive for living.
 - 5. Salvation is made possible through: verses 4-6
 - His riches Romans 11:33; Colossians 1:27; 2 Cor. 8:9
 - His mercy withholding from us what we deserve
 - His grace giving us what we do not deserve
 - · His great love unconditional love
 - 6. His purpose for saving us. verse 6

To demonstrate His power, wealth and kindness to us - verse 7

7. Man has no part in God's great salvation; verses 8

Grace, faith and salvation are totally of God. It is a gift. If man could work for it then (1) he would have whereof to boast; and (2) God's grace would be of no effect; (3) to advocate a works-based salvation casts an aspersion upon the sovereignty of God. Verse 10 assures us that God's grace produces salvation which produces works—not the reverse.



Grace's prayers

DATE: June 18, 2017 **TEXT:** Ephesians 1:15-23

In our text this week, Paul gives us a crash course in how to pray for the fellowship of the church.

- 1. Paul rejoiced in their faith and love toward all the saints. What power would be wrought if God's people in the local body rejoiced in the faith of the believers and demonstrated pure unconditional love for all the saints. Paul never ceased to give thanks for the church. A pastor will do his church no greater service than to spend hours upon his knees (1) communing with God, and (2) interceding on behalf of the flock. (verse 15)
- 2. Paul made specific requests as he prayed for the people of Ephesus. (verse 17) He always prayed for the church to have a spirit of wisdom - insights into the mysteries of God, and the God-given ability to act upon those insights with a deep, intimate knowledge of Him.
 - 3. Paul also prayed that the church would be able to

comprehend the immeasurable, all encompassing greatness of God's power which is in us (Ephesians 3:20)

- 4. Paul knew that as their hearts were filled with the light of understanding (discernment) they would have a greater knowledge of God's riches. 1 Corinthians 2 tells us only the spiritual man is able to discern the deep things of God. Paul was passionate in this discernment growing among the
- 5. Paul explains that the "exceeding greatness" of (God's power) already works in the members of the body. (verse 19)
- 6. The Source of that power comes from Christ, and as Christ led captivity captive (Ephesians 4) He simultaneously dispersed spiritual gifts to the body as He was being raised from the grave to sit at the right hand of His Father.
- 7. Paul reminded the church of the position of God the Father and the Son—they are above all principalities not only in this world, but the world to come.
- 8. Paul emphasizes the truth that all this power has been vested in the New Testament Church. (verse 22) He

has unleashed this awesome, indescribable power into His church—His Body—What things are bound on earth are bound in Heaven - whatever things are loosed on earth shall be loosed in Heaven. (Matthew 18:18) That power has been unleashed on the church. None of us today have a clue as to the magnitude of the power Christ has endued the church

If Ephesians could be given a title, it might be 'The Glory and Power of Christ Unleashed in the Church."

them can eat their fill.

Think what we have accomplished together as an association of churches that each church couldn't possibly have done alone.

Another quality of great followers is that they are tireless workers who are focused on the prize, the goal of the work at hand, and do not compare what they do with others. That's why we must maintain the right focus.

To make the main things the main things takes loyalty and determination because commitment is the glue that holds the teammate to the team and the team's objectives. It has been said that "Many hands will make light work." That's just common sense!

Enthusiasm is contagious! The people in our text were so fired up about the work that they finished it in 52 days. Nearly all the people were eager to join in the work at hand. Sadly, there will always be those who, for whatever excuse, will justify their inactiveness—like the leaders of Tekoa, who must have thought the work Nehemiah and the others were doing was beneath them.

If you don't get anything else out of this message, remember great followers (not so much great in size, but great in passion) is where it's at! Nehemiah is not even mentioned in Nehemiah 3, but the names of the people who built the wall have their names recorded there in God's Word. Let that be an encouragement to you.

When people make up their minds to work together, nothing

can hinder them from fulfilling what God has called them to do. We, as an association, have been given the privilege of being a part of something much larger than ourselves. We have been given the opportunity to work together and to invest in local, state, national and global ministries through the planting of churches, broadcasting to people who had never heard the Gospel before, providing teaching materials and aiding local churches, and educating the Nehemiahs of tomorrow — and the list can go on and on.

A 17th century quote says: "If everybody would sweep the area in front of their own home, the whole street would be clean." That means, in order to accomplish God's purpose, we need a common vision, dedicated leaders and willing workers

There will always be resistance to the work of God. That's why we need to work together as if it all depends on us, and pray together as if it all depends on God.

I will close with Paul's exhortation to the followers in Corinth: "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye stedfast, unmoveable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labour is not in vain in the Lord" (I Cor. 15:58)

Can your association count on you to exercise your influence and leadership? Can the association (the team) count on you to help her be all she can be for the glory of God? If we can do that, the best days of the BMAA are yet to come!
