119th Annual Meeting of the BMA of Texas held in Lufkin

The Baptist Missionary Association of Texas met for its 119th Annual Meeting at Keltys First, Lufkin on Nov. 4-5, 2019. There were 187 messengers and 41 guests present. Twenty-eight churches were represented by letter only. Ninety-seven churches were represented by messenger. The offering received totaled \$8,630.

Bro. Robert Easterling, president of the Baptist Missionary Association of Texas, welcomed messengers and visitors and introduced the theme of the meeting, *God is Faithful*. Following the introduction of the theme, he preached from Psalm 119:90 about God's faithfulness.

A testimony was shared by Bro. Rachid, a Moroccan Christian convert from Islam whose father was an Imam. He was the host of a weekly live call-in show on Al Hayat Television where he compared Islam to Christianity. His topic was *Understanding and Engaging Your Middle Eastern Neighbors*. Brother Rachid also delivered a sermon during the Monday

evening general session in which he compared the god of Islam to the one true God. Prior to his sermon, those in attendance enjoyed singing by Dr. Blanton and Jaime Feaster. Dr. Feaster serves as vice president of executive affairs at Jacksonville College.

A number of breakout sessions took place on Monday afternoon covering topics including BMA Disaster Relief, Spanish language ministry, Texas

Baptist Home's five-year plan and a breakout session led by Bro. Rachid.

The Women's Missionary Auxiliary met for their annual meeting on Tuesday morning as did the annual Leadership Conference, sponsored by BMA Texas Missions. The speaker for the Leadership Conference was Dr. Dave DeVries. DeVries is a coach, trainer and strategist and founder of Missional Challenge. He spoke on the topics of multiplying disciples and multiplying leaders.

Departmental reports were heard Tuesday afternoon beginning with the Texas Baptist Home for Children (TBHC). During the report,

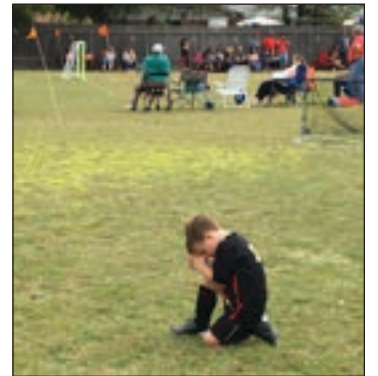

Prayer is Always in Order—Even on the Soccer Field!

With eyes closed and hands clasped, four year old Noah Patterson dropped to one knee and began to pray. It's not unusual to see a child praying beside his bed at night but Noah and the other little leaguers were in uniform, fully engaged in the middle of a soccer game. Someone standing close by said that when Noah finished praying, he stood and shouted a strong "AMEN!" Later when Noah's Grana asked why he was praying in the middle of the game his answer was simple. He just needed to pray that they would all have a good game.



Noah is a member of our extended family and I shared part of his story in the July 2018 Heart Connection. Before he was born, family, churches and friends covered this little boy with constant prayer, begging God to intervene. When he was 13 days old he had open heart surgery and even though the prognosis was not good, today his heart is strong and healthy.

It's no wonder Noah was comfortable praying on the soccer field. That's what he does at home with Mom and Dad every day; at Grana and Poppa's house, in Sunday school, at preschool and even at Upward Soccer. Prayer has become a way of life for Noah, a connection with Jesus this little 4 year old has learned to depend upon.

Thinking about this committed little prayer warrior reminds me of Hannah's story

(I Samuel, chapter 1). Broken hearted because she was barren, Hannah repeatedly begged God for a child but no answer came. To make matters worse, her husband, Elkanah, had another wife who had borne him two sons and she was constantly poking fun and hurling hurtful words in Hannah's direction. According to this account, I'm pretty sure Hannah had just about reached her limit! She cried. She couldn't eat, and to make matters worse, her husband didn't have a clue. This takes us right to the heart of the problem. No one understood and no one could help. Even Eli the High Priest got it wrong. He could see that Hannah's lips were moving but she made no sound, so he accused her of being drunk, suggesting she should put away her wine. Hannah was desperate. It didn't matter that people were watching and judging her unfairly. She was deeply distressed and weeping bitterly as she begged God for a son, promising to give the boy back to serve God all the days of his life. This time Hannah's prayer was answered! Read to the end of the chapter and you'll see that she also made good on her promise.

Hannah's story and this picture of little Noah remind me that prayer is always in order. No matter where I am. No matter who might see. Or hear. Or judge. May this Thanksgiving holiday be a special time of praise and prayer for you and your family!

TBHC President Jason Curry spoke about the Home's five-year plan which includes exploring campus improvement, exploring new client services, developing a capital campaign plan and organizational growth. TBHC plans to open an office in the Denton County/Collin County Area and eventually serve over 2,000 children. Curry also reported that 14 children in the care of TBHC received Christ as their personal Savior this past year.

A constitutional amendment was approved that will allow TBHC's board of trustees to have the responsibility of electing the officers of the Home in order to meet accreditation requirements.

President Dr. Mike Smith reported on behalf of Jacksonville College. Smith said that enrollment for the fall semester is over 500. He also noted that Jacksonville College is a mission field as many who attend the college have no church background. This past year, 80 students made salvation decisions. Smith encouraged churches and individuals to consider an end of year gift to Jacksonville College. Total gifts received up to \$150,000 will be matched by the Southern Baptists of Texas Convention.

This editor reported that *Baptist Progress* had a good associational year. Encouragement was given concerning churches joining the *Baptist Progress* Church Plan whereby churches pay for the subscriptions of each member household at a discounted rate. Currently, only 162 churches of the nearly 400 churches in the BMA of Texas are on the Church Plan. We would like to see more churches join. It was emphasized that *Baptist Progress* is a ministry that promotes interest in evangelism, benevolence and Christian education among the churches of the Baptist Missionary Association of Texas. A request was made that churches consider adding *Baptist Progress* to their monthly budgets as subscription income is not sufficient to meet the annual budget.

BMA Texas Missions Director Heith Mitchell reported that there are now 29 church mission projects across the state. He issued a challenge that the BMA of Texas add 100 new churches within the next 10 years. Goals for BMA Texas Missions include seeing an aggressive multiplication movement of churches who make disciples, equip and release leaders and start churches for the glory

of God and the advancement of his Kingdom mission, that each new mission begins with a plan to begin three new churches in their first 10 years, that pastors and churches of the association be encouraged and equipped to start new churches and that new prospective church planters be identified and evaluated.

Jerry Burnaman, manager of the Baptist Missionary Loan Association (BMLA), shared how churches and individuals could invest in BMLA. There are three ways to help including, a contribution from an individual or church, an interest free loan, or investing in share accounts or investment certificates. Burnaman said that at the end of August, the BMLA has 253 investors, and total assets stand at \$14.5 million. BMLA now provides loans for 21 projects, and has sufficient money available to help other growing churches.

Elected to serve on the BMA of Texas administrative committee with term ending in 2023 were Timothy Fish, a member of South Park, Fort Worth; Elton Moore a member of Calvary, Fairfield; and Tim Nall, pastor of Mt. Pisgah, Mineola.

Elected to serve on the BMA of Texas nominating committee with term ending in 2022 were Gary Southard, pastor of The Church at Valley Ranch, Porter, and Riley Pate, associate pastor of Stone Ridge, Kilgore. Dr. Edwin Crank, who is on staff at Cornerstone, Jacksonville, was elected to serve out an unexpired term on the nominating committee with term ending in 2021.

WMA President Johnnie Ross reported that the auxiliary surpassed their goal in raising money for their project for the year—renovations of the swimming pool at Texas Baptist Home for Children. They chose the Martha Johnson School in Mexico as their project for the new associational year and chose as their annual theme, *Sweet Hour of Prayer*.

Mike Green reported on behalf of Master's Builders. Master's Builders worked on seven projects this past year, have been raising roofs for Christ for 28 years and have 26 active members. Green encouraged others to join Master's Builders as they conduct building projects for BMA churches and other causes.

Leon Ross was elected as president of the BMA of

Texas for the 2019-2020 associational year. Ross serves as pastor of Latch, Gilmer. Ryan Burchett, pastor of Northside, Garland, was elected as first vice president. Dr. Mark Livingston, pastor of Keltys First, Lufkin, was elected as second vice president. Wayne McKay and Eddie Ballard were reelected as recording clerks.

Elected to preach the annual message next year was Charles Johnson, pastor of Rosewood, Gilmer. Eddie Ballard, pastor of First, Bardwell, was elected as alternate speaker.

Tuesday afternoon, more breakout sessions were offered covering topics such as Activate, BMA 101 (an orientation for new BMA pastors), a worship team swap meet and a youth team swap meet.

Tuesday night of the meeting, the Jacksonville College Choir sang some very uplifting songs of worship followed by the annual message delivered by Larry Barker, pastor of Cornerstone, Jacksonville. Barker preached an encouraging message to pastors from 2 Corinthians 6:8-10.

A commissioning service was presented by BMA of Texas Missions at the close of the meeting. Several new state missionaries were introduced and given an opportunity to speak. As mentioned above, there are now 29 BMA of Texas mission projects.

Elected to serve as new state missionaries this year were Chris Mindi, Leander (Resident Intern); Mike Watt, Tahoka (Lead Missionary); Trevor Cowen, Tahoka (Associate Missionary); Wesley Burke, Nacogdoches (Lead Missionary); Jesse Hales, Round Rock (Resident Intern); Gamalier Luna, El Paso (Lead Missionary) and Cesar Cantu, Lake Jackson (Resident Intern). Also elected was Chris Driver as Texas Missionary Care Coordinator.

The 120th Annual Session of the BMA of Texas will be held at Farley Street, Waxahachie, Nov. 16-17, 2020.

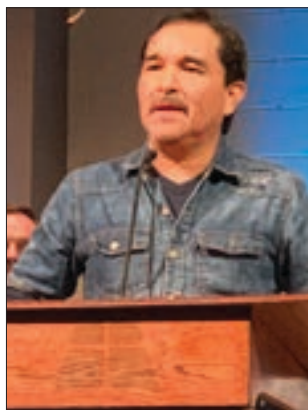

Dear Friend of Jacksonville College,

God is faithful and continues to bless Jacksonville College. Our enrollment is over 500 for the fall. Over eighty students have professed Christ as Savior. On three separate occasions, groups of JC students have traveled to the Gulf Coast to aid in disaster relief. In addition, our accrediting agency, the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC), has completed their on-site visit and determined that we are compliant in almost every area. However, in order to achieve compliance in one area by the end of 2019, we need your help.

Jacksonville College ended 2018 in the black with a balanced budget, and we must do the same for 2019. The need for costly repairs has contributed to our financial problems. We have had roof and plumbing issues, and our library developed mold due to air conditioning problems and a leaking roof. We have made repairs in the past, but now the only solution is to replace the roof and the air conditioning system.

It is imperative that we finish the year strong. The Southern Baptists of Texas Convention (SBTC) has issued a matching grant of up to \$150,000. We must raise \$150,000 by the end of 2019, and we ask that you make an extra end-of-the-year gift to help us meet our goal. With the matching gift from the SBTC, your gift will be doubled. INSIGHTS *for* PASTORS

Mission-minded

Every pastor knows his church must make missions a priority (Matthew 28:18-20). Missions is one of the foundational principles for being part of an association. But how can we lead our churches into becoming personally involved in mission work? While no one right answer exists, here are seven suggestions for helping your people be more mission-minded.

Stress missions. Infecting the church with the missions' bug starts with the pastor. Your people will not catch what you do not possess. By preaching, teaching, and emphasizing missions, your church will develop a passion for mission work. Before you start, spend a season of prayer, asking God to make your church a great mission church.

Form a mission team. Find those in your church who already have a mission fever. Then charge them with raising the church's awareness. Let them also plan and carry out their ideas for involving the church in missions. As the pastor, your job will be to support the mission team and to promote their ideas. Utilizing a team will not only involve people, but they will generate more ideas than you could alone.

Start in your community. Too often when we think of missions, we think of other parts of the world, but one

of the most overlooked mission fields is right in our own backyard. Most people are afraid of knocking on doors. To alleviate those fears, we've practiced random acts of kindness like passing out free water bottles on a hot day in front of Wal-Mart (be sure to ask for permission first). Each water bottle had the church's name and address on it. Then we washed windshields, leaving a note that our church did it. We annually pass out free popcorn during our community's Christmas parade.

Take short-term mission trips. Twice a year, we lead a small group on two foreign mission trips, working with BMMI (Baptist Medical Missions International) and working with missionaries directly on building projects. Those who've gone on these trips tell us they are life-changing. When these groups return, they report to the entire church, infecting everyone else.

Establish a fund. At our church, we have the GIMP (Go In My Place) fund. Because not everyone can afford to take a mission trip, the church has set up a fund that pays half the cost. GIMP is funded solely by individuals that give above their tithes. This way, even those who can't go on a mission trip can have a part in missions.

Have a mission fair. Every year our mission team plans a mission fair in the place of our regular morning service.

They decorate the auditorium, invite missionaries to speak, show videos from past mission trips, and provide lunch with foods from around the world. Over the years, this has become one of our most anticipated services.

Develop a relationship with missionaries. By getting to know a missionary, his family, and field personally, your people will fall in love with missions. They will offer their prayers, support, and make calls, and write letters as they stay up to date with what's going on with "their" missionary.

Because every church is unique, find your mission voice, come up with your ideas, and develop your own mission activities. Having a heart for missions builds enthusiasm and gives hope for the future.

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSONS

Announcing the forerunner's birth

DATE: December 1, 2019

TEXT: Luke 1:1-25

Luke writes the account. (Verse 1-4)—Dr. Luke, Paul's personal physician, not only wrote the details of the subject matter we are dealing with this week—the announcement of John the Baptist—but he wrote an exhaustive account, tracking the ministry of the New Testament church in Jerusalem. In Luke 1, he was addressing these words to Theophilus, (friend of God). Some say he was a Roman official, while others suggest he might have been a Jew from Alexandria. It is also suggested that the word was an honorary title given to a great educator.

God chooses the unlikely. (Verse 5-8)—Zachariah, (*Jehovah has remembered*) who was a priest in “the division of Abijah” (one of the 24 divisions of the priesthood divided by David—1 Chronicles 24:10)

and Elizabeth, (*God is my oath*) were chosen of God to be the parents of John the Baptist. Their experience is reminiscent of Abraham and Sarah, who gave birth to Isaac, in their old age. Zachariah and Elizabeth were deemed too old by human standards to bear children. This is but another way for God to demonstrate His miracle working ability, and to quell any doubts as to the Sovereignty of God.

God chooses the faithful. (Verse 6-10)—Both Zachariah and Elizabeth walked in righteousness, keeping the commandments and ordinances of the Lord. It is during times that God's servants are the busiest when He appears to them or calls them. The lot fell to Zachariah which landed him the task of burning the incense when he went into the temple as the multitude was in prayer.

(Verse 11)—Something miraculous happened—the angel of the Lord appeared beside the altar, and after calming his fears, the angel noted that they would have a son, John.

God's promise is sealed, even in the unbelief of His servant. (Verse 18)—But even after this great promise of giving birth to one who would be the forerunner of the Savior, Zachariah expressed unbelief. Whenever God promises something overwhelming and magnanimous, often doubt follows. “. . . I am an old man and my wife well stricken in years.”

(Verse 20)—The angel (Gabriel) announced that Zachariah would be stricken mute as a result of his unbelief.

(Verse 21)—The people perceived correctly that Zachariah had received a vision from the Lord concerning his and Elizabeth's son, who would be the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy, “Every valley shall be exalted And every mountain and hill be brought low; The crooked places shall be made straight and the rough places made smooth. Isaiah 40; Luke 3:1-5.

Announcing the Savior's birth

TEXT: Luke 1:26-38

The angel appears to Mary (verse 26). Six months after the angel, Gabriel, finished his announcement to Zachariah and Elizabeth, he had another visit to make—to a virgin girl named Mary, who was betrothed to a man named Joseph who was a descendant of David. According to Jewish custom, a man and a woman were engaged for a year. During that time, the bridegroom would be preparing a place for her in his father's house. Then, one glorious night, at the end of that engagement, the bridegroom would appear at her house and give a shout. She would go away with him

to his father's house, and there the wedding feast would take place.

The favor of God falls on Mary (verse 30). Surely there would have been hundreds of young Jewish girls who would be suitable to bear the Son of God. But God, in His sovereign, infinite, and matchless grace, bestowed His favor on Mary.

The blessed doctrine of the virgin birth (verses 31-35). These verses, among others, verifies and declares that Christ, the Son of God was conceived in the womb of Mary, by the Holy Spirit. No seed of any man on earth would have sufficed in bringing forth the Perfect Sacrifice for the remission of sin. The virgin birth was the path through which God the Father would incarnate Himself into Man.

All in the family (verse 36). Elizabeth, who was a “daughter of Aaron” (Tribe of Levi) (Luke 1:5) and descended through Moses' brother. Mary descended from Judah through David (2 Samuel 7:16, Tribe of Judah). God the Father had this all planned out from before the foundation of the world. He makes no mistakes (verse 37)

The unwavering faith of God's servant “. . . be it unto me according to thy word” (verse 38). Even though she felt a twinge of fear (verse 30) and apprehension (verse 34) she knew in her heart she had been selected to be a part of the greatest event ever in world history—to bear the Son of God.

The birth of Jesus

TEXT: Luke 2:1-20

God's providence (verses 1-3). The king always declares himself sovereign over a kingdom, but Caesar Augustus, who was demonstrating his power over the Roman Empire, in reality, was nothing but an instrument in the hands of the true, supreme, sovereign God, Who had an infinitely larger, more far reaching, divine Kingdom. “The king's heart is in the hand of the Lord, as the rivers of water: he turneth it whithersoever he will” (Proverbs 21:1).

God's power illustrated (verses 4-7). Little did the Caesar Augustus realize that he was the instrument to fulfill prophecy. Micah 5:2, “But thou, Bethlehem Ephratah, though thou be little

among the thousands of Judah, yet out of thee shall he come forth unto me that is to be ruler in Israel; whose goings forth have been from old, from everlasting. This is Jesus Christ—the Lamb slain from the foundation of the world. The plan was established in the infinite mind of God in eternities past. Prophecy also established the lineage—the bloodline through which the Savior of the world would come.

The world's rejection of Christ illustrated (verse 7). Jesus began His physical life in rejection—even as a babe lying in the manger. The “no room in the inn” was an early indicator as to how the world (especially the Jews) would receive Him.

The unlikely first recipients of the glorious news (verse 8). It was not announced to governmental magistrates—it was announced to humble, common men on the Judean hillsides,

tending their flocks.

God has always spoken to the humble—the insignificant by the world's standards.

The glory surrounding the presentation of the Savior to the world (verses 9-12). It was a frightful experience for the shepherds. God's glory is unfathomable. Humankind is not able to receive the full force of the glory of God. God told Moses in Exodus 33:20, “. . . you cannot see My face, for no man can see Me and live.” The glory of God was absolutely appropriate in introducing the Lord Jesus to a lost world.

The incident brought praise and adoration (verse 13-20). The shepherds were drawn to Him (verse 15). They spread the word of His coming (verse 17). Their hearts were filled with rejoicing (verse 20).

Rejoicing in the gift of Jesus

TEXT: Luke 2:21-38

The dedication of Jesus (verses 21-24).

1. Mary and Joseph were faithful to keep the Jewish rituals and the law.

a. The circumcision of Jesus: when He was 8 days old, signifying the Abrahamic covenant. Also, this was the day in which Jesus was named.

b. The Purification of Mary (Leviticus 12:1-4). The presentation of the burnt offering (Leviticus 12:6-8); and the presentation of

Jesus in the Temple, and the presentation of the burnt offering

c. The presentation of Jesus in the Temple.

The prophecy of Simeon.

a. Simeon was a righteous man. The Holy Spirit was upon him, and led him to the temple at the exact time Jesus was to be there.

b. Simeon was promised that he would live to see the Messiah. Now that he had seen him, and was able to hold Him in his arms, he was ready to die. He was privileged to see, first hand, the salvation of the Lord.

c. Simeon pronounced a blessing on Mary and Joseph, and foretold the effects Jesus would have on the world (verse 34). Many would fall (those who would reject him as the Messiah) and many would rise (humble themselves and repent of sin and receive Christ).

The prophecy of Anna.

Anna, daughter of Phanuel, of the tribe of Asher, was a faithful worshipper in the temple, and a widow, was likewise on hand when Mary and Joseph brought Jesus to the temple. She gave thanks for Him.

Jesus' power over death

TEXT: Luke 7:11-17

Nain was a small village about 25 miles southwest of Capernaum. By this time, a large crowd had gathered around Jesus, and was walking with Him. The party saw a funeral procession as they approached the village. A widow was about to bury her only son. But she would have the encounter of a lifetime as she met the Savior. In this lesson, we observe three things.

Jesus' compassion for the widow. Compassion is one of great virtues of Christ. Being God incarnate, we come to understand the heart of God, and learn of our wonderful Heavenly Father's tender compassion. He takes thought for the tiniest sparrow that falls from the sky. We see his loving compassion in the father of the prodigal son, as he ran to him and embraced him with joy because the son had returned home. Jesus' heart went out to this

grieving widow.

Jesus' power over death. Jesus, in response to Martha's comment about her brother Lazarus, who had been dead for four days, said, "I know that he shall rise again in the resurrection at the last day. Jesus said, "I am the resurrection, and the life, he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live" (John 11:25-26).

Jesus and God are one. It seems in verse 16 that the people, although glorifying God because the man was raised from the dead, they only regarded Jesus as a great prophet "risen up among us." Possibly they did not recognize Christ as the Messiah. One of the great tenants of the Christian faith is the truth that God came to earth in the form of man, to be the sacrifice for sin. It is essential that for one to come to Christ, they must believe that he is God come in the flesh. 1 John 4:3, "And every spirit that confesseth not that Jesus Christ is come in the flesh

is not of God. . ." Jesus Christ is God tabernacled among us on earth. Isaiah prophesied hundreds of years before Christ came to earth, "Therefore the Lord himself shall give you a sign; Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel."

Immanuel literally means, "God tabernacled among us" or "God pitched His tent among us."
