

A total of 259 people from churches across the state gathered for the 121st Annual Session of the Baptist Missionary Association of Texas (BMA of Texas) at New Harmony, Tyler Nov. 4, 2021. Churches represented by messenger totaled 105 and churches represented by letter totaled 23.

A total of 160 messengers registered as did 99 visitors. Eleven more people attended the 2021 meeting than attended the 2020 meeting.

Petitioning churches welcomed into the BMA of Texas included Harmony, Normangee. Harmony was an established church that reverted to missions' status and was restarted under the leadership of Pastor Robert Lee. Also accepted into the association were Iglesia Bautista, Nacogdoches, led by Pastor Neptaly Molina and Redemption Hill, Fort Worth, led by Pastor Brett Holcomb, both original church plants of BMA Texas Missions.

The day began with a BMA of Texas department directors and state missionaries meet and greet Thursday morning. BMA of Texas President Leon Ross then called the meeting to order thanking Chris Webb, pastor of New Harmony, Tyler, and the church for hosting the meeting this year. What incredible hosts the church family was, providing those in attendance with breakfast, snacks throughout the day and a delicious barbecue lunch.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Prior to the president's message, his son, Josh Ross, sang "In Christ Alone." Using Matthew 16:18 as his text, President Ross then preached a sermon titled, *His Church, His Victory, Our Opportunity*, noting that the theme the Lord impressed upon him was the same as his sermon's title.

He noted that when Peter answered Jesus' question saying, "...thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God," Jesus responded by saying, "I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."

Ross said that during his ministry it was Jesus who built His church, and it is Jesus who assures us that the gates of Hell shall not prevail against it. He continued, "And as members of His local congregations, He has given us a great opportunity to serve in His triumphant church."

The president noted that Jesus Christ is the foundation rock upon which the church is built, and it is, therefore, His church. In speaking of the Lord's victory, Ross said, "When Jesus built His church, He built it to last."

He continued, "We know that the Lord's church has been under constant assault from the beginning even until now and will continue to be under assault until the trumpet sounds. Depending upon the time it has been persecuted, ridiculed, shoved aside and ignored, but the church that Jesus built has and will endure."

Ross admonished, "Jesus pictures a church out in the world assaulting the gates of hell, which will not prevail against it. Jesus entered into the world and invaded Satan's territory and rescued us from the chains of sin.

He said, "As He entered into the world to rescue us, He sends us out into the world with the gospel message to rescue those held in bondage by sin, saying, "all power is given unto me in heaven and in earth, go ye therefore, and teach all nations," (Matthew 28:18-19a)."

The president then turned his attention to the opportunity the Lord has given His church and most notably the churches of the BMA of Texas.

He said, "In light of His victory and the power available to us, the Master sends us forth. The opportunity is not just for pastors, teachers, church leaders; the opportunity is for the church."



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Eric Johnson—Growing up in a church planting environment

Although he is only in his mid-40s, Eric Johnson has been many miles down the gospel trail and has been involved in a myriad of ministries in BMA work.

The third-born son of Buddy and Martha Johnson, Eric Johnson's earliest memories were the years when his dad began his work as a missionary in Mexico. Eric was born in Mexico and grew up there until he turned 17.

"Dad went to Huejutla, Mexico before I was born, and started a church—Primera Iglesia Bautista, and dozens of church plants (throughout Mexico) came from that church," Johnson said.

He continued, "Dad couldn't be pastor there because at that time it was illegal for Americans to pastor in Mexico, but he led in the initial stages of that church and discipled some men to become pastors."

Johnson said he has never seen a more active church that has planted more churches than Primera Iglesia Bautista in Huejutla. He also attributes the strength and aggressive missions program to pastors aggressively promoting the mission program and the associated work in their churches.

"Those pastors really work at making the association strong," he said.

Eric, along with his older brothers Grady and Scott, and his younger twin brothers, Ben and Jon experienced home-schooling by teachers from the U.S. Eric also attended public schools there and had dual citizenship.

"I just grew up experiencing the small-town Mexico life," he said.

He continued, "Taffy was one of the U.S. teachers who came after I left home. It was at the time that my mom, Martha, passed away, and my dad and Taffy ended up getting married."

The oldest brother, Grady, wears many hats in the ministry of Mexico, serving as the missions director for the entire association, helping pastor El Alba Baptist Church in Pachuca and leading in the Martha Johnson School.

The Johnson family ministry in Mexico extends three generations. Eric's grandfather, Grady Johnson, traveled to Mexico in 1956 to help organize the first BMA church there. Buddy Johnson spent around 30 years building the work there, and now, Eric and his brother, Grady, and their sister, Sara Rose, have ministered there.

From the beginning of the BMA work in Mexico, the Johnson family has been able to see it grow. Now, they are in partnership with the BMA of America and have planted churches In Mexico and even beyond its' borders, including Venezuela.

One of the miracle stories of the Johnson's ministry in Mexico is about Sara coming into their lives. A pastor and his wife who ministered in the Aztec Villages, which was about a three-hour drive from Huejutla, had 11 children, including premature twins who were only 24 hours old when the father came to the Johnson's home and asked for help.

"Sara was a twin and only weighed two pounds," Eric said, noting that the mother was ill and did not think she was strong enough to nurture both babies, so she decided she could nurse the boy since he was stronger, but not the girl which was extremely troubling to the parents.

Johnson said, "Mom and Dad went and got them, and when she picked Sara up, she seemed to be lifeless."

But Martha wrapped her up and when they got in the Jeep and started back to town, Sara started moving a little, and she spent the next six weeks in an incubator.

"So really, from the first day she was born, she has been in

our family—she's my sister now—she came to the United States, met and married a preacher, Tommy Rose, and the couple have returned to Mexico where they are serving as missionaries," Johnson said.

Scott is a mechanical engineer at the Toshiba Plant in Houston. Ben and Jon work at ETech in Jacksonville, and are active members of First, Jacksonville where Eric recently assumed the pastorate.

In 1992, Eric moved to the U.S. and spent his final year in high school in Conroe. Afterward, he moved to Bullard where he lived with his older brother Scott. During that time, he joined Rose City, Tyler, where he met his wife, Kelly.

"Six months after we married, I was beginning to feel the call to ministry," Eric said, citing the influences of pastor Mike Prescott and Dr. Phillip Attebery who were instrumental in getting him started on a path toward ministry.

"Dr. Attebery encouraged me to start taking classes at the BMA Seminary," Eric said, stating that he received his master's degree there.

Jacksonville College announces the retirement of Michael Creech

Director of Distance Education Michael Paul Creech was honored at a retirement reception held at the Central Baptist Church Youth Building. The whole College community, including administration, faculty, staff and alumni attended the event to honor Creech's 29 years of dedicated service to the College mission of "Challenging Minds and Transforming Lives."

"We are so grateful for the tremendous contribution that Mike has made to Jacksonville College," said College President Joe Lightner."

Lightner added, "Mike investing his life into reaching students for Christ is an inspiration to our Jacksonville College family."

Former College President Mike Smith said that, "Mike truly left his mark on Jacksonville College. He was more than just an employee; he was a friend and servant of our Lord."

Smith added, "No one was more knowledgeable and possessed a servant spirit than him, working many hours behind the scenes and on weekends and late at night so that the College could have the best in technology."

Creech joins a long line of Jacksonville College employees whose lives have left a legacy of sacrifice while fulfilling the mission of the College. He began teaching at the College August 1992 and subsequently serving as the Business and Computer Science Department Chair, Chief Information Officer, and the first Director of Distance Education, laying the foundation for the distance education program. Creech's significant contributions to the advancement of technology at the College include leading his students to create the first website of any college in the East Texas area. He guided the College in choosing and implementing the Empower student information system, allowing online registration and tuition payment. He also implemented the College's first Learning Management System, paving the way for course materials to be made available online, an invaluable benefit when COVID-19 forced all colleges to go online.

Creech served numerous other leadership roles during his nearly 30-year career at the College. He was on the leadership teams for the 1999, 2009 and 2019 Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on College (SACSCOC), the regional association for the accreditation of degree-granting for higher education. Serving as the Quality Enhancement Plan advisor, he provided the QEP Leadership Team assistance for "Going the Distance with Distance Education," a plan to guide the College's educational focus over the next ten years.

Colleagues expressed deep admiration for Creech, commenting on his patient instructions as he assisted faculty and staff with technological needs.

"Mike never let me know that he was frustrated because of my technology deficiencies. I require much assistance

and patients and Mike always seems glad to give both," commented Mark Rogers, religion instructor. Others praised Creech for his professional approach to solving problems.

Marolyn Welch, former Vice President of Academic Affairs, said, "Working with you [Mike] during my time as faculty and then as Academic Dean has been the greatest of pleasures. I have valued your support and your professionalism in every matter, whether student, faculty, or IT related. Jacksonville College has benefitted these many years from your expertise as Chief Information Officer and most recently as Director of Distance Education. You will be greatly missed in both of these roles. Thank you for being a true friend to the college and to me."

Dr. Patricia Richey, history, government, humanities, and computer science professor, said "I learned to respect your dedicated work ethic and your constant commitment to stay current with technology as you sought hardware, software, and applications that would benefit our mission at Jacksonville College. You did all of this with a servant's heart and a friendly spirit."

The College alumni also remembered Creech's admirable characteristics while they attended and worked with him at the College. Lt. Col. Chaplain Tony Cleaver, former JBC Bible teacher and BMA Seminary professor, said, "You are a good man. You have been a good man to many over the years. You were an especially good man to me while I was at JBC. Your helped me time and again. You showed an example by your behavior of what patience was all about. Your influence will live on in many lives even after your steps stop on JBC campus."

Kaley Lybrand Dean, former JBC student and Dean of Students added, "I can't express my gratitude enough for being as patient, diligent, and hard-working as you. You've

From there, Johnson moved to Texarkana where he served as youth director at Hillcrest, Texarkana, where his dad, Buddy, had returned for his second stint with the church. Two years after Eric arrived, Buddy resigned and the church called Eric as pastor.

Later, Pastor Vernon Lee of First, Jacksonville, asked Eric to pray about coming to lead a Hispanic work there which had been begun by Eric's dad. Eric served there from 2005-2008. At that time, he applied with the national missions department to return to Mexico. His desire was to plant a church in Pachuca in Hidalgo, not far from his boyhood home in Huejutla. They were also interested in working with the BMA Bible Institute in Mexico, which was led by Ricky Williams. But the couple moved to Pachuca to start a church.

"Our plan was to remain in Mexico for life," he said, noting that the church had gained 70 people in six months

But Kelly, who gave birth to to their first child, developed a life-threatening bacteria, and after a long time of suffering with the disease, the couple was strongly advised to return to the states.

When Phil Knott left his post as the international missions director for the Baptist Missionary Association of America, Eric was tapped to fill the position. So, they moved back to the states, and lived in Greenbriar, Arkansas. The ministry was a joy to Eric, but the Lord began to burden him about returning to the pastorate, that was when First, Jacksonville contacted him. He accepted the call and loves the ministry at Jacksonville.

"One thing we have learned from Dad was to develop a love for mission work, and we have also developed a love and loyalty to BMA churches. We love the people here and are still trying to get settled and find out what's going on," Johnson said.

When asked about his vision for First, Jacksonville, he said, "I don't think I have a vision-the Lord has the vision-that is to evangelize the lost, disciple the evangelized, and equip the saints to do the work of ministry. Outgrowth of those things will be training for the church and discipleship.'

While Johnson is grateful for the great resources and facilities of his new church, he insists that people must be his focus.


"I'm thankful for the ministries pastors have done here at First Baptist," he said.

He continued, "The Lord has used this great church in a mighty way through the years."

Eric Johnson sees himself as being in at Jacksonville for the duration.

"Wherever I have been, I have never had a plan to do anything other than what the Lord had led us to at that moment. That is still true today, as I served as pastor of First, Jacksonville," he said.

He continued, "We feel grateful to the churches of the BMA who have stuck with us in ministry-through the highs and lows, and we are thankful to the Lord for bringing us to this place."

Ross pointed to the words of the apostle Peter who wrote, "... ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house, an holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ," (1 Peter 2:5).

The president stated, "The church is its strongest when individual members find their unique position within the body and fill that role for Jesus' honor and glory. Find your place, serve faithfully and do not grow weary in doing what is right. Now is not the time to draw back, now is the time for God's people to rise and let their voices be heard."

He concluded, "The victory has been won, we declare redemption and salvation from the position of the victor. The opportunity is ours this morning, will you seize the open doors of opportunity that God places before you and your church."

LEADERSHIP CONFERENCE

Following the president's message, a number of breakout sessions were provided for those in attendance. After lunch BMA Texas Missions hosted the annual leadership conference. Todd West, newly elected BMA of Texas Pastor Connections Coordinator, introduced Jason Collins, lead pastor of Crossroads, Rowlett, to speak on the topic, *Church Community Impact: Opening the Door to the Gospel.*

COORDINATING COMMITTEE

This editor presented recommendations, including the proposed BMA of Texas constitutional changes published in the last issue of *Baptist Progress*. All were approved without opposition. Messengers approved that the 122nd Annual Session of the BMA of Texas be held at First, Livingston, Nov. 7-8, 2022.

Elected to serve a three-year term on the Coordinating Committee were Charles Attebery, former executive director of the BMA Foundation; Diana Morris, project coordinator for the Texas WMA; and Randy Decker, music minister and member of Tundra, Canton.

SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON BMA OF TEXAS/ SOUTHERN BAPTISTS OF TEXAS CONVENTION RELATIONS

Committee member, Charles Johnson, pastor of Rosewood,

Gilmer, reported that the special committee appointed to review the fraternal agreement between the BMA of Texas and the Southern Baptists of Texas Convention (SBTC) met and recognizes that churches of the BMA of Texas, being autonomous, are free to associate with any group they may choose, including the SBTC. He continued, "At the same time, the BMA of Texas welcomes any SBTC church member, pastor or church staff member to attend BMA of Texas workshops or other events."

"However," Johnson said, "it is the agreement of our committee members that the two ministries in which the BMA of Texas and the SBTC should work together are Jacksonville College and the Texas Baptist Home for Children."

He continued that since the first agreement was made between the association and the convention, the two groups have only participated in two events, therefore, the committee did not feel it necessary to continue in an official fraternal agreement. The recommendation of the committee, which was approved, was that the fraternal agreement be dissolved.

OFFICERS ANNUAL SPEAKER

Elected to replace Ross, who was term-limited, as president of the association, was Ryan Burchett, pastor of Walnut Street, Winnsboro, who had served as first vice president. Second Vice President Michael Pool, pastor of Antioch, Gilmer, was elected as first vice president, and Eric Johnson, pastor of First, Jacksonville, was elected to serve as second vice president.

Next, came the election of an annual speaker and alternate annual speaker for the 2022 BMA of Texas Meeting. Messengers chose James Schoenrock, pastor of Sheppard Drive, Euless, to preach next year's message. Elected as the alternate annual speaker was Robbie Caldwell, the former longtime pastor of New Harmony, Tyler, who currently serves as interim pastor of Friendship, Mesquite.

TBHC

Jason Curry, president of the Texas Baptist Home for

Children (TBHC), shared that every believer, church and ministry do something for the glory of God. He continued that TBHC has been tasked with caring for children for the glory of God. Curry informed messengers that TBHC will soon open a foster care office in Odessa in order to serve children and families in the Permian Basin. The office will be the third satellite office opened across the state by TBHC.

A home for teen mothers will also be opened by TBHC in Waxahachie. Through that ministry, young mothers will receive skills to be the best parent they can be for their newborns. The constitutional changes proposed by trustees of TBHC in the last issue of *Baptist Progress* were approved.

BAPTIST MISSIONARY LOAN ASSOCIATION

This editor, who also serves as director of the Baptist Missionary Loan Association (BMLA), reported that 10 loans had been made available to churches of the BMA of Texas since September 2020. The BMLA now manages assets worth \$20 million. Loan terms have been extended for the first time, from 15 years to 30 years, and loan rates have been lowered. Messengers approved for the BMLA to begin offering loans to BMA churches outside of Texas. This director (Jerry Fulton) was reelected.

BAPTIST PROGRESS

This editor reported that he believes *Baptist Progress* took ministry and information to a new level during the last associational year. He thanked Paul Gauntt and Chris Driver who have serve as correspondents for *Baptist Progress* and encouraged pastors to lead their churches to join the *Baptist Progress Church Plan*, whereby churches pay for each member household in their congregation to receive 12 issues of *Baptist Progress* per year.

He also reported that *Baptist Progress* provided four Ministry Connection Workshops to churches, pastors and church staff during the 2020-2021 associational year, including interim pastor training. Six new workshops are planned for the 2021-2022 associational year. Messengers approved subscription rate increases for the newspaper.

This editor was reelected to serve another year.

JACKSONVILLE COLLEGE

Dr. Joe Lightner, who became the new president of Jacksonville College, following Dr. Mike Smith's retirement last year, reported that it is his goal to lead the college in offering new degree programs, provide better pay and benefits for employees, continue to renovate and refurbish buildings on campus and provide more room for housing. The college embarked on a *52 Day, Rebuilding for Fall Campaign* this summer.

Messengers approved that the college receive its annual *Jaguar Day Across Texas Offering* May 1, 2022.

Following Lightner's report, the Jacksonville College Singers presented a worshipful concert.

BMA TEXAS MISSIONS

Heith Mitchell, director of BMA Texas Missions, reported that there are currently 34 mission projects in Texas. BMA Texas Missions has also added Todd West, of Arkansas, to serve as the pastor connections coordinator for the state association.

New missionaries elected to serve in Texas under the director of BMA Texas Missions were Roberto Marcelletti, Isaias Martinez, Haitao He, Bichitananda Satpathy, Chris Winkler and Jose Torres. Messengers also approved that the following projects be supported as presented in the department's budget: Hispanic Mission in Go Forth, Kilgore; Lighthouse Mission, Houston and Iglesia Bautista Emmanuel Mission in Garland.

Mitchell presented each state missionary, missionary families and BMA Texas Missions staff during a Missions Commissioning Services, repeating an often-used phrase by BMA Missionary Buddy Johnson, "More churches, more glory!"

ANNUAL MESSAGE

The meeting ended with a stirring message preached by Ronnie Mills, pastor of Kingdom Chapel, Saginaw. Using Daniel 6:1-28 as his text, Mills noted, "An old preacher once said, "God is faithful, and He expects His people to be faithful. God's Word speaks of faithful servants, faithful in a few things, faithful in the least, faithful in the Lord, faithful ministers. And all points up that day when He will say, 'Well done, thou good and faithful servant.'"

He continued, "Alexander the Great was asked how he had conquered the world. He replied, 'By not wavering.""

Mills also noted that Athanasius, at the Council of Nicaea, said, "If all this world falls from the truth, I will stand!"

From there, he spoke of how every believer should faithfully serve the Lord, even when faced with persecution, adding, "No revival swept through the captive nation as a result of Daniel's ministry, no national repentance in Babylon, like Jonah saw in Nineveh. Few people seemed to learn anything from Daniel. For all his wisdom, integrity, and faithfulness, Daniel reaped the jealousy of peers."

He then exhorted, "You see revival isn't what we need, God is the one that brings revival, what we need is to be faithful like Daniel, and to be thankful for the faithfulness of the saints, the few who are ready to serve in and out of season—because honestly, they are the Daniels of the Bible."

Mills noted, "Daniel was faithful, and quite frankly, the church could use more Daniels—one's who really don't care about making a big splash, drawing a lot of attention to themselves, getting the spotlight, but rather who just love the Lord, and want to faithfully serve Him."

In speaking of how Daniel was entrapped by his enemies, yet faithfully bowed in prayer three times a day in plain sight for his enemies to see, the pastor said, "Daniel had faith that saw beyond, causing him to believe what he couldn't yet see church, let's not stop believing in what our God has promised us—the Kingdom."

Mills pointed out that while Daniel's life was significant, his story was about how God can use the faithful wherever he has placed them, exhorting his audience to dare to be a Daniel.

The pastor drove home his point by concluding his message with a poem written by John Oxenham:

"Is your place a small place? Tend it with care—he set you there.

Is your place a large place? Guard it with care—he set you there.

What er your place, it is not yours alone, but His, Who set you there."


THE GIFT IS RECEIVED BY FAITH.

Providing for children

Oftentimes, when we ask God to provide, we want to see supernatural provision—manna from heaven, so to speak. But most of the time, when we ask God for provision, he uses the common...the ordinary; the hands and feet of those around us to meet our needs.

Philippians 4:19 says, "And my God shall supply all your need according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus."

Brother McClung knew the children would have their needs met, yet he didn't hesitate to be the hands and feet that went in search of those who God would use to meet them. He demonstrated in his years at TBHC his trust in God's provision, yet knew he had a role to play in it as well.

McClung saw the impact of World War 1 on the globe and the US which in return impacted the orphanage. So, McClung stayed on the collecting trail. He let everyone know that he would be happy to be invited by churches or would be happy to invite himself.

On days he was at the orphanage, if needed, he would travel from home to home to get enough money for bread to feed the kids. On Thanksgiving 1916, McClung said "turkeys were out of reach of your financial agent., but Mr. A. N. Sherbert, one of the leading grocery men of our little city (Italy) has supplied me with a large fat possum, and while I write, Alice is putting yam potatoes around him..." As with anything, they were grateful for the gift, but when Christmas time came, the kids were not disappointed that possum was absent because they were able to enjoy turkey! In 1918, there were 80 children living at the orphanage, so McClung strove to care for the growing needs of the orphanage.

Today, again, finds TBHC a different place. The special holiday meals are not prepared or served at TBHC campus; they are served just like in my home and your home. Our kids enjoy holidays in their temporary or forever home with their family. Our continued financial needs grow during holidays. And just like McClung, we can't always wait for the "birds to start singing."

Surprisingly, the beginning of school and the holiday season sees the greatest number of children entering foster care. Our Christmas gift drive, along with our Christmas financial drive, are essential to our ability to care for our kids. McClung paved the way for many methods of tugging on people's hearts and I am blessed that the asking is simple, and the givers are generous. And just like then, our hope remains to protect TBHC from debt and provide for children.
