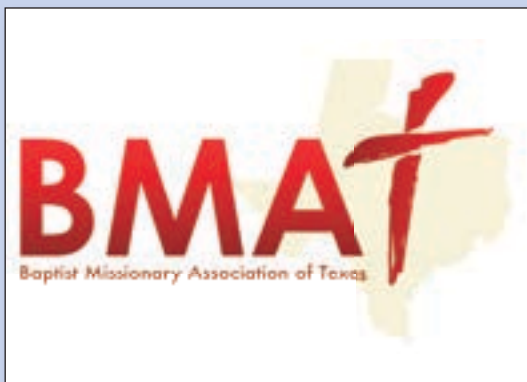

Church Health

Committed to discipleship

Are we truly committed to discipleship? What does that mean if we are? Has anybody really gotten this process of producing disciples figured out? Why are not more mature disciples being produced who help train and equip more disciples? How do we help people to grow up into mature reproducing disciples? We preach the Great Commission but do we practice it daily? If we are truly committed to discipleship then why are churches not producing more disciples who look like Jesus?

There are many different answers to the above questions, but let's be careful to not make excuses or rationalizations. All too often, there seems to be a disconnect between our plan for discipleship and the implementation of that plan. In *The Disciple Making Pastor*, Bill Hull says, "The crisis at the heart of the church is that we give disciple making lip service, but do not practice it." With such a whirlwind of frenetic church activity it is easy to lose sight of our primary purpose, making disciples!

Bill Hull gives three things a pastor must do to remain committed to discipleship: "First, the pastor must possess convictions concerning disciple making and declare it as top priority from the pulpit. Second, the philosophy and its goals should be published in church literature and placed into the constitution as the criteria for measuring success. Third, the disciple-making philosophy must be modeled at the church-leadership level. The pastor and leaders should be effective disciple makers themselves."

The observations above could be discussed and maybe even debated but the author is stressing the importance of an "all in" attitude when it comes to our commitment of making disciples. We cannot afford to be defensive or sensitive about such a vital biblical command. A commitment to discipleship means that we are not just theoreticians but, rather, practitioners.

Here are some things to consider in making this commitment and then following through on designing your discipleship process.

First, make sure you know where you are headed and what your goal is. What does a disciple of Christ look like? How do you define being mature in Christ? It is interesting to hear all the different answers you will get from people when you ask them to define a disciple and discipleship!

Second, develop visuals that will help people to see what the journey looks like. Of course, the first step is salvation. The new believer is an infant in Christ and needs extra special care. Then they grow into children as they continue maturing in Christ. In the next stage the disciple becomes a young adult as they learn to walk with Christ. The disciple then becomes a parent, reproducing disciples who make disciples.

Third, decide what a disciple needs in each stage. Whether you use 101 – 401 classes, new member classes,



small groups, or some other format, you must have a plan in place to provide what is needed at each level. As infants, new believers need to have someone who will help them develop the new habits necessary to ensure continued growth. Who will explain baptism, spiritual disciplines, and other necessary ingredients for spiritual growth to continue?

Fourth, decide on how you will implement discipleship and growth opportunities at all levels. The temptation is to focus on certain size groups when spiritual growth is important in all settings and for all sizes. Jesus refers to the 120, 70, 12, and the 3. We have worship gatherings that are important for the entire congregation to be together and for the word of God to be preached but we also need relational environments where more intimate discipleship can occur.

Fifth, realize that transparency, authenticity, and accountability occur easier in smaller groups. It is not enough to confess our sin and bring it out into the open without being cared for by other disciples we can trust. In *DiscipleShift* David Putman says, "Life-changing decisions are supported by accountability and discipline and inspiration that comes through continual relational togetherness." Plan out your process that fits your context that will make a Bible-based gospel-focused discipleship system available. Here are a couple more things to consider:

You need to train your disciplers. If we want more out of our team then we must invest more into our team. For the dream (vision) to work the team must work. You cannot expect it to just happen. It does require intentionality. Yes, we are totally dependent on the word of God and the Spirit of God but

the people of God play a crucial role in this also.

You need to look for those who are receptive. Do they have a desire to be discipled and are they willing to commit to the process? If you are not careful, you can waste a lot of time with those who are not quite ready for this level of commitment. There is always a risk and there are no guarantees that they will follow through but we must be careful to look for those who are teachable.

People are willing to open up more in smaller groups and this is how we can evaluate where they really are spiritually. This is not so we can judge them but rather so we can figure out how we can best minister to them and help them in their spiritual growth.

Celebrate growth at all levels and stages. We celebrate when someone is born-again, and we should, but we should also celebrate other spiritual victories. We celebrate when a child learns to walk, when they graduate a certain grade, when an adult achieves one of their goals, and when a parent has a baby.

Healthy churches are committed to planning and implementing a process that demonstrates their commitment to discipleship!

Changes coming for *Baptist Progress*

PUBLISHING SCHEDULE CHANGE AND BUDGET CUTS

The newspaper industry has seen a lot of changes over the past 15 or so years with the advent of the Internet. The way people communicate has changed drastically with advances in technology—email, texts, websites and more. Newspapers across America have experienced large decreases in their amount of subscriptions, reduced the number of times they publish and some have even closed.

To add to the new way of communicating, paper and postage costs have continued to increase. With the changes in communication and the cost of paper and postage, adjustments have to be made. The old adage is true, “Money doesn’t grow on trees.”

For the past few years, *Baptist Progress* has continued with its current publishing scheduling due to funds received by churches that have closed, as well as funds received from the closure of the Baptist Book Center. Such extra income cannot and hopefully will not be depended upon in coming years. We would much rather see our churches thrive than to benefit from the closure of even one.

Therefore, because it is necessary to scale back our budget, *Baptist Progress* trustees will recommend that *Baptist Progress* cease printing two 12 page issues per month and begin printing one quality 16-page paper per month. Of course, those who subscribe by email will still receive news alerts, the Ministry Connection newsletter, e-News Updates and more news.

If you wish to receive up-to-date news, almost as it happens, your best option is to become an email subscriber. Email subscriptions deliver the paper digitally, as it appears in print.

Pastors are urged to lead their church plan subscribers to switch from print to email subscriptions now. Again, current print subscribers may also try the email version of *Baptist Progress* for free before switching to an email subscription.

Other changes will be made to our budget in order to save money in the 2016-2017 associational year. If approved, changes will become effective following the BMA of Texas Annual Session in November.

Assets of the BMLA continue to grow

Presently Baptist Missionary Loan Association assets total about \$10.6 million, an increase of \$500,000 in the past year. There are 252 investors with the BMLA: including individuals, churches, local associations and auxiliaries. We appreciate you, and give a big thanks for your faithful support.

Presently we provide loans for 24 projects and have money available to assist more churches with funds to help with their growing ministries. If your church plans to build or buy property, it would be a joy to talk with you about a loan.

I am very thankful for our faithful trustees who give their time and support to help the BMLA have an effective ministry in assisting our churches and missions. We have people on our trustee board with very good financial

expertise: bankers, businessmen and pastors. They are a great help to me and I appreciate their leadership.

There are three ways to support the Loan Association:

- A contribution from an individual or church.
- An interest free loan.
- Interest loans that compound quarterly. Currently we are paying 2% on share accounts and 2.5% on Investment Certificates. These rates may change during the year depending on the financial climate.

Your financial support and prayers are essential for the BMLA to have part in assisting the BMA to plant churches and provide funds for growing churches.

A bitter-sweet year for Texas Baptist Home for Children

It is the goal of each public speaker to say something that will have a lasting impact on the listener. Over forty years ago, Rev. C.O. Strong preached at Temple Baptist Church in Marshall, Texas. The basis of his message was a passage in Exodus that relates a time in which Israel was in the wilderness, the people journeyed three days without finding water. They came to Marah, but they could not drink the water because it was bitter – "Marah" means bitter or bitterness. The people grumbled to Moses, "What are we going to drink?" So he cried to the Lord, and the Lord showed him a tree. When he threw it into the water, the water became drinkable. Bro. Strong pointed out that in the Christian life we often have to take the bitter with the sweet. We also know that on occasion God will give us test to see if we really believe what we say. Statements such as, "If you can explain everything that is happening in your Christian life, God is not doing it."

In the last year our ministry has gone through a time of learning to take the bitter with the sweet. The first four months were times of rejoicing as we were impacting the lives of more children than any time in our history. November is recognized as National Adoption Month and we received a foretaste of what would prove to be the year that records would be set through our adoption ministry. Couples and individuals were responding well to accept the challenge to serve as foster or adoptive parents. Churches responded well to the Back-to-School and Christmas appeals. The response to the Change for Children Campaign proved to be another productive year.

On Dec. 17, 2015 a federal judge in Corpus Christi handed down a ruling that would change residential childcare, as we had known it, for many years. The ruling was to call for the closing of all residential group homes. Group homes are homes that

provide for more than six children. All six of the campus homes would fall under this regulation. Five of the cottages are equipped to house eight children and one has room for 12. Many of the community homes that contract with the Baptist Home were group homes. Children who were placed in residential care before the December date were allowed to remain in the placement; those who came after that date were moved, some to shelters. In the final eight months of the year the number of children under the care of this ministry went down from 160 to 112. While this was going on 25 to 30 children are sleeping in CPS offices or where ever space can be found. This affects almost everything concerning our ministry. That is the bitter.

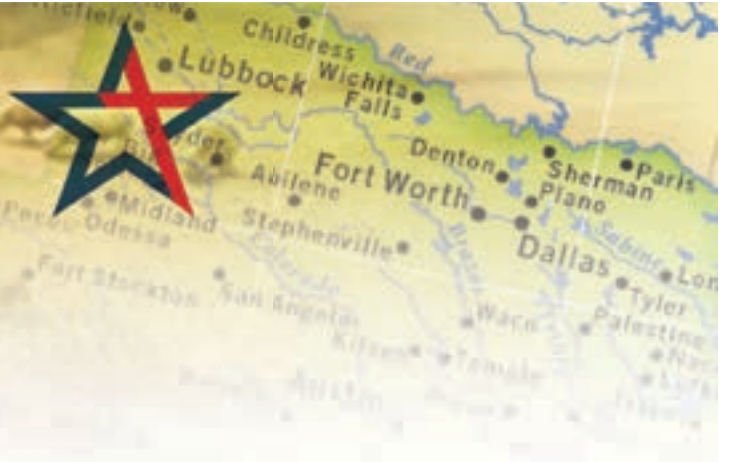
As was mentioned earlier, this was a wonderful year for the Adoption Department as 46 children found a permanent home through adoption. One of the goals of Texas Baptist Home for Children is to see children come to Christ. This year 22 made that all important decision. The Lord has blessed this ministry with the finest staff to be found anywhere. There is a true team spirit. We are blessed to have a great group of loving and nurturing foster families and families who have opened their hearts and homes to make room for a child who desperately needs a home. Our Heavenly Father has answered the prayers of childless couples by placing a baby in their arms.

Many residential child-care agencies have not been able to survive through this crisis. One of the reasons is that they do not have the faithful support of the Southern Baptist of Texas Convention and the Baptist Missionary Association of Texas. Due to your partnership, Texas Baptist Home for Children continues to carry out the mission that the Lord has called it to do, caring for boys and girls who are displaced from their homes and families, and pointing them to Christ and a better future. That is the sweet!

We are in 17 publications/papers, and we distribute free literature on current moral issues. We give to our Association meetings and churches as we visit these magazines: American Family Association (AFA) Journal, Israel My Glory, The Judicial Watch-Verdict, One Voice United in Prayer, Family Research Council publications, and the Focus on the Family.

We continue to provide access to our Moral Action website (www.macbma.net). This site provides our churches tools for study and steps to contact our elected officials. On this web-page we provide Bible Gateway, Got Questions.org, What Can One Person Do?, Reconstructing American History, and the Directors monthly reports, articles and archives.

Moral Action continues to champion the moral and spiritual causes that are so much to Associational Baptists: (1) The battle to keep the words "In God We Trust" on our coins and paper money and (2) to keep "under God" in our National Pledge. Many seek to remove these words.

Our travels continue to Washington D.C. and include our activism in the long-term fight against abortion, gay/lesbian marriages, homosexual causes, and the ever-present casinos of America. Since my election in 2008, I have spoken to and interviewed these elected officials and pastors in your behalf as churches, pastors and deacons: Dr. Jack Graham of Dallas/Plano, Texas, Dr. Bert Harper of American Family Radio, U.S. House Chaplain Pat Conroy, the late U.S. Congressman Alan Nunnelee of MS, 1st District, U.S. Congressman Dr. Tom Rice of 7th District South Carolina, U.S. Congressman Mark Meadows of 11th District North Carolina, Historian David Barton, U.S. Congressman 4th District Robert Aderhold of Alabama, U.S. Congressman Joe Barton 6th District of Texas, U.S. Senator James Lankford of Oklahoma, U.S. Senators Roger Wicker and Thad Cochran of Mississippi, U.S. Congressman Jack Hensarling of 5th District Texas, U.S. Congressman Greg Harper of 3rd District, Mississippi (who gave Mrs. Adams and me a tour of the Congress Prayer Chapel), presidential candidate and U.S. Senator from Texas Ted Cruz (who we interviewed twice), U.S. Speaker of the House 8th District of Ohio, John Boehner, as we led in prayer before Congress, former U.S. Congress lady Michelle Bachmann of 6th District, Minnesota,

U. S. (Congressman) now Senator Tom Cotton of 4th District Arkansas, past U.S. Senator Blanche Lincoln of Arkansas, past Mississippi Governor Haley Barbour, past Governor and recent Presidential candidate Mike Huckabee, and Mississippi Secretary of State Delbert Hosemann. With these personal contacts, Moral Action has also mailed, texted, and telephoned many other political, religious, and influential leaders such as Donald Trump, Dr. Ben Carson, former President George W. Bush, Senator Bernie Sanders and former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton.

You may ask what we discuss. Always with courtesy and respect, most topics centered around (1) the need of a godly, Christian nation, (2) to keep the pledge and coins as they are in recognizing God, (3) the concern over Islam and Muslim Sharia Law and its influence rising in America and (4) the desire to protect and support God's people, Israel. My joy is to speak the name of Jesus Christ before these political leaders.

OUT OF THE CLOSET

Homosexuality is out of the closet completely today and abortion is still heavily supported via liberals of America. These

two current debates that are ongoing will not go away. Our Holy Father detests these two "great abominations." Take my life, but...

How many times have we made desperate promises to God if He will just grant us one wish in prayer. "Lord, I'll give you my time, my money, my talents, if you'll just..." Or, "Lord, I would go witness to my neighbor, but..." There are so many excuses that I'm sure, in our human thinking, the Lord just shakes his head and of course knows what the outcome will be. What if Christ had made excuses for going to the Cross? What if he had said, "Not today, or let someone else do it?" God has designed each of us to do a specific work for Him and has equipped us with the talent to do it. All it requires is our being willing to accept the challenge. The following is a 4-part program that can be expanded by each person as the Holy Spirit leads. It is taken from the song: "Take My Life and Let It Be." (The congregation sings the first verse.)

I. "TAKE MY LIFE AND LET IT BE, CONSECRATED, LORD TO THEE."

Yes, I remember when I did that. I dedicated my life to God when I was young. Lately, I haven't thought much about that decision. It's hard to be really consecrated to the Lord with all the responsibilities I have. There are the kids and their daily schedules of soccer practice and piano lessons, grocery shopping, household cleaning chores, walking the dog, and working out at the gym. My Sunday school teacher said that if I put Christ first, He will help me with my priorities. She told me to look up these scriptures: Matt. 6:33; John 14:6; John 13:37; Acts 20:24; Matt. 16:25; and John 15:13. That's a lot of reading, but maybe it will help me. "Take my hands and let them move at the impulse of thy love." My hands...they represent my ability to work and to serve others. If I let Him, Christ could love people through me. I must let the Lord take

my hands. He must be the driving force, because He is love. His love must flow through my hands to others. God has placed me where I am for a special purpose. I must be open to God's leadership for whatever it is that He would call me to do. (Esther 4:14; Psalm 16:8; Psalm 24:4; I Timothy 2:8; Ecc. 9:10; Isa. 59:1). (The congregation sings the second verse.)

II. "TAKE MY FEET AND LET THEM BE, SWIFT AND BEAUTIFUL FOR THEE."

These words remind me of how busy I am. I never have enough time or energy to do what I want to do for God. I must organize my time and priorities. I also must be careful where I go and with whom I associate. I take Jesus with me wherever I go. I must remember from where I came. I was a sinner with no direction. People are watching us for an example, especially children. (Psalm 40:2; Psalm 119:101-105; Proverbs 3:5-6; Romans 10:15b; Ephesians 6:15). "Take my voice and let me sing always, only for my king." It's easy enough to sing praises to God in a worship service. But, God wants to control my voice all the time. He wants to speak through me. God doesn't want our ability as much as He wants our availability. He wants our willingness to speak to the lost about Him. When our desire is to give honor to God, He will bless our efforts no matter what we think of our performance. I Corinthians 14:15,19; Psalm 100; Psalm 19:14; Matthew 12:36). (The congregation sings the third verse.)

III. "TAKE MY SILVER AND MY GOLD, NOT A MITE WOULD I WITHHOLD."

God is concerned that I give to my church, but His concern doesn't stop there. Will I let him control the way I

manage my money? God loves a cheerful giver. He doesn't need our gifts because all things belong to Him. (Malachi 3:8-10; Mark 13:42-44; I Corinthians 16:2; 2 Corinthians 9:6-8). "Take my moments and my days, let them flow in ceaseless praise." Time...my busy schedule that squeezes God out. Perhaps if we gave God our best time in the early morning when we are the most refreshed, He would help us get our priorities in the right order. We usually find the time to do what we really want to do. The problem must be with our "want to." God gives each of us 24 hours in a day. What do we do with them? I'm afraid many of them are wasted. We always find time for entertainment. Do we find time to praise and worship God? (Psalm 25:5; Psalm 35:28; Romans 13:11; 2 Corinthians 6:2; Psalm 146:2). (The congregation sings the fourth verse).

IV. "TAKE MY WILL AND MAKE IT THINE, IT SHALL BE NO LONGER MINE."

Do we really mean those words? I use my will to make decisions. Every decision I make is important to God. I know I would really feel more at peace if I prayed about every decision, even those that appear insignificant. God has given us a will; the ability to choose. He doesn't force His will on us. We are not robots, but He wants our will to agree with His Will. (Luke 22:42; I John 2:17; John 5:30; Philippians 2:5). "Take my heart it is thine own, it shall be thy royal throne." My heart, emotions...God loves me. I want to love Him back. After I express my love to Him in prayer, I feel more free to express love to other people. When we talk about giving God our heart, we mean our whole being, everything we believe and feel. Hiding God's Word in our heart is essential if we are to resist the devil and witness to those who do not know Him as Savior. Have you given God your heart? To help us glorify God by our lives and be effective witnesses, we need to know and obey the Scriptures. When you study the Scriptures you will discover the blessing of placing your full trust in God. God gave us His Word not only to increase our knowledge but to change our lives. Make it your habit to daily memorize and meditate on His Word. (Matt. 12:34; I Samuel 16:7; Psalm 119:10-11; Proverbs 3:5-6. God indwells us by His Spirit who will, if we allow Him to control our lives, give us a dynamic for living and make us more like Jesus each day. When God asks you to step out of your comfort zone and teach a class, sing a special song for worship, speak to your neighbor about Christ, do it, knowing that he will guide you and bless you.

Sunday School Lessons

James—Practicality

DATE: October 9, 2016

TEXT: James 1:2, 3, 26, 27, 2:14-17; 3:13; 4:11, 12; 5:7, 15, 16

It was only after Christ's resurrection, that James, the half brother of Jesus, came to accept Him as the Messiah and as the Savior of the world as was demonstrated when James spoke during the Jerusalem council (Acts 15:13-31.) Neither he nor his brethren accepted Christ before He ascended (John 7:5).

James, who later became a pillar in the Jerusalem church, was obviously a great pastor — a practical pastor, as is demonstrated in his epistle. James put, into plain language, that which indicates that one is a true follower of Christ.

1. James explains the process of sanctification (James 1:2, 3, 26, 27). James explains how joy can come to a child of God who suffers temptations and trials. Because the spiritual man realizes God's agenda for producing maturity through hardships.

2. James explains two outward manifestations of a genuine faith: (verses 26, 27). a. self-control, especially in reference to the tongue; b. expressing compassion, love and ministry to those who can pay no recompense (widows and orphans)

3. James explains that good works are the outgrowth of saving faith: Not the reverse - (good works producing faith) (2:14-17)

4. James explains that a mature Christian is filled with wisdom (the God-given ability to make right decisions based upon the knowledge of the Word) a worthy lifestyle (conversation) and self-control (meekness.)

5. James explains that a mature Christian only judges himself (1 Corinthians 11:28-31). Therefore, he is a "doer of the law." Only God in Heaven has the authority and right to judge. (James 4:12)

6. James explains that a mature believer has a keen awareness of the conditions of the world around him, which give indication that the Lord's return is imminent (5:7). He has power in prayer (5:15) and he is aware of his besetting sins, and seeks to have his brethren to intercede in prayer for him.

1 Peter—Suffering

TEXT: 1 Peter 1:6, 7; 2:19, 20; 3:8, 9; 4:12, 13; 5:8-10

Peter was writing to believing Jews who suffered persecution and martyrdom under the emperor of Rome, Nero.

1 Peter 1:6, 7 — Peter gives solace to persecuted saints saying they are "kept" by the power of God (verse 5). He reiterates what James said about the ability of a believer to rejoice during persecutions. (James 1:2-4) He comforts them in that the persecutions are:

- temporary (for a season)
- necessary (if need be) trials or persecution are never needless in the life of a believer, nor is it out of the realm of God's control;
- Temptations are "manifold" — meaning multi-faceted, or multi-colored. There are countless temptations and tribulations, just as there are innumerable shades of colors.

In 1 Peter 4:10 it speaks of the "manifold grace of God." For every shade of suffering and tribulation a believer may endure, there is a shade of God's grace to offset it and to meet the need.

1 Peter 2:19 — Peter notes that

suffering for doing God's bidding, is "thank worthy." God especially blesses the Christian who suffers for doing what is right — rather than one who suffers as a result of failures of the flesh.

1 Peter 3:8, 9 — Peter admonishes believers to demonstrate unity, compassion and love to one another. Our flesh is prone to render insult for insult, but God has called us to bless those that insult us. He promises a blessing.

1 Peter 4:12 — Peter encourages the saints to not be surprised when trials come. Jesus told His disciples what the attitude the world would have toward Christianity. There would be scoffers, revilers, and persecutors. The act of rejoicing in the midst of such (verse 13) is alien to what the world believes.

1 Peter 5:8-10 -- A warning is issued to the saints to be vigilant, to be watchful for, and to resist the adversary who seeks to destroy. The adversary comes at us through the lust of the flesh, through hatred, doubt, fear, jealousy, suspicion, and anything else in his arsenal which he intends to use to destroy our relationship with Christ and our very lives. A great promise is given us of growing into maturity, steadfastness, strength and rest (Hebrews 4:1-4).
