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Heaven's Gates and Hell's Flames Brings Thousands to See Drama

There's an old saying, "Set a church on fire and people will come to see it burn." This proved to be true in Fairfield as the Christian drama 'Heaven's Gates and Hell's Flames' was presented twelve times over the past three weeks by a local church's congregation.

"I'm a 60 year old pastor and I've never seen anything like this as long as I've been preaching the gospel of Jesus Christ," said Fairfield's Calvary Baptist Church pastor Terry Skinner.

What was originally planned to be only a three night presentation would end up encompassing three weeks of four performances each week. Members of the Calvary congregation played the different roles in the drama with Reality Outreach Ministries' Ty and Cindy Fisher, a husband and wife evangelist team from Cayuga, Texas, directing the thought-provoking and decision-prompting drama. The incredible gold and silver decorated stage included the gates to Heaven and a downward staircase to the pits of Hell. Angels and 'The Book of Life' were part of the set in every scene.

It is estimated that more than 5000 people watched the drama unfold as viewers were asked to consider the question 'If you were to die today, where would you spend eternity?' It's a question that is played out in numerous scenes on stage, all real-life dramatizations that people in the

audience might relate to: a mother who is begged by her young daughter to attend church with her, teenage drinking and driving, co-workers having lunch, a husband and wife on an airplane traveling home from vacation, teenagers taking drugs at a party, a two-vehicle accident. Each scene ends with the actors losing their lives. Some walk through the Gates of Heaven, but those not saved are dragged to Hell by Satan and his demons. Both are extremely emotional and powerful scenes.

The drama has been presented in more than 100 countries around the world and Reality Outreach Ministries has evangelist teams constantly in more than 40 countries. The powerful message drew people from as far away as two hundred miles from Fairfield. Many churches brought vans and even buses full of people. Freestone, Limestone, Leon, Anderson and Navarro counties were represented each of the twelve nights. Many other counties were represented as well.

Members of other local churches came to Calvary to assist in child care several nights. Many people came multiple nights and each night brought either family members or friends. One lady from Teague brought a total of 60 youth from her community during the three weeks of performances.

Each person who received Christ as their



savior or rededicated their life to Christ was given a Bible and other documents to explain 'what just happened and what happens now.' Calvary purchased 1,100 Bibles and printed more than 10,000 documents to give to those responding to the call. Less than 100 Bibles remained following the final presentation. When all twelve performances were concluded, Calvary recorded 549 people receiving Christ and 460 rededications. These numbers do not reflect those who perhaps didn't make a decision during one of the presentations, but did later as a result of seeing this life-changing drama unfold before their eyes at Calvary Baptist Church.

"Calvary has seen revival," said Skinner to his congregation Sunday morning. "Fairfield has been revived. Freestone County has been revived. Churches all around us have been revived and have either baptized or are planning to baptize the many who came forward during this event."

The local Calvary pastor encouraged his

congregation and other churches to "continue the revival" that began as a result of the drama 'Heaven's Gates and Hell's Flames.' Calvary generally sees 100-150 hits on their web page. One week during the performance that number jumped to over 18,000.

Evangelist Ty Fisher stated to the audience after each performance "This isn't about growing Calvary Baptist Church. This is about growing the Kingdom of God!"

Mickey Worley commented on Calvary's web page "My youngest grandson and I attended the Heaven's Gates and Hell's Flames drama on Monday night, August 3rd. The performance was great and best of all, Darrel Worley accepted Christ. Praise God! I am so happy he made this decision because he just signed up for active duty in the Navy. I was so proud to see him accept Christ. I love Calvary and I pray that this revival will continue and spread more and more. We as a nation need God very much right now."





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rom the Edin 14 things NOT to say to your pastor

On his website, Dr. Thom Rainer listed 14 things one should never say to his or her pastor. After reading it, I took the liberty of providing some commentary to the items he listed. Dr. Rainer's listed items are in bold. The remaining comments are mine.


- 1. I wish I had a job like yours, where I would work only one day a week. Some people just want to be funny, and everyone should have a sense of humor. It has even been said that a pastor must develop a thick skin. I get that! However, some people really mean it when they make such a comment. Chances are no one in a pastor's congregation is responsible for preparing two to four speeches (sermons) each week. Few in the congregation are burdened by the sins they see committed by those of which they have oversight. Only a small number of church members have to make last minute changes to plans they have made with their family because they are needed. No pastor worth of his salt works only one day a week. Come to think of it, such a comment mentioned even in jest is not that funny, but rather insulting
- 2. What do you do with all the free time you have? This comment is similar in nature to the one above.
- 3. Can I have a couple of minutes before you preach? Don't ever approach your pastor with a problem, complaint, last minute announcement, prayer request or any other matter just before he preaches. His mind is focused on preaching the Word of God to persons who need to be discipled and some who need to be saved. Don't break the pastor's concentration with trivial matters. If you have an announcement or a prayer request, write it down and hand it to the pastor. Don't expect him to remember it when he is about to take the pulpit.
- 4. I love you pastor, but (fill in the blank). Forget everything after the word "but." If you either love your pastor or you don't. And, if you don't love your pastor, the problem lies within you, as the Lord has instructed us to
- 5. I like your preaching, pastor, but I really like _ (fill in the blank with television

love. Period!

or podcast preacher). Why would such a statement even be necessary? Think before you speak!

- **6.** Can your wife play piano? We laugh, but how many times has a pulpit committee asked a pastor candidate if his wife can play the piano? I actually know of a church that chose a candidate as pastor because the church desperately needed a pianist, and the candidate's wife happened to be one.
- 7. Your kids shouldn't behave that way. After all, they are pastor's kids. If you are not the pastor, then God has not assigned you with the task of monitoring the behavior of your pastor's children. That's his job.
- 8. Your low salary is good for you. It keeps you humble and dependent on the Lord. All that I can say to one who would make such a comment as this one is that he or she should really read God's Word more often. Here are a few suggested passages: Galatians 6:6, 1 Timothy 5:17-18, 1 Corinthians 9:9-14, 1 Corinthians 9:14, 2 Thessalonians 3:7-10, Acts 20:33-35, 1 Thessalonians 5:12-13, Philippians 4:16-19, Luke 10:7, 1 Corinthians 9:18-19, 2 Corinthians 11:7-9, Romans 4:4, Acts 4:32-35, Matthew 10:8-10, Acts 6:2, 1

Timothy 3:3. Wow! You didn't know there were so many passages in the New Testament about paying the pastor well, did you? Shame on the churches that make such comments as, "I believe we could get by with paying the preacher this amount." Such a comment is derived from an attitude of disobedience to God's Word. Do what God says and He will take care of the matter.

10. Pastor (predecessor pastor) didn't do it that

way. I once heard of a church member who approached his pastor and said, "When Bro. Jones was pastor, he always mowed the church lawn." The wise new pastor replied, "Yes, I've spoken with Bro. Jones, and he said that he doesn't want to that anymore." Church member, if the Lord expected your pastor to do things the exact same way as your former pastor, then your former pastor would probably still be your pastor. A pastor who arrives on the field in 2015 should not be expected to do things the way a pastor did them in 1975 or 1985 or even 2014. It's a new day. You have a new pastor. Follow his leadership as he follows the leadership of the Holy Spirit.

- 11. You don't have a real degree. You went to seminary. Are there people who have actually made such a comment?
- 12. How long do you think you'll be at our church? No pastor can promise you how long he will remain at your church? There are life circumstances and new assignments given by the Lord that are beyond a pastor's control. I personally do not believe that the Lord wants every man He calls as pastor to remain at the same church for the rest of his life. I find no evidence of this being God's will anywhere in scripture. Granted, it might very well be the Lord's will for some to stay at one church throughout their entire ministry. Some have, and in so doing they have been blessed and were a blessing. However, no such expectation should be placed on every pastor.
- 13. Did I wake you up pastor? It's only 1:00 a.m. Really??? While this comment may be listed in jest, I will say that I always told my church members to feel free to call me at any time, day or night, and I meant it. It was my pleasure to be called upon for spiritual guidance or comfort.
- 14. Did you hear what they are saying about you? Now this is one that gets to me. Some well-meaning church members love their pastor so much that they think they should run to him and tell him everything they've heard people say. Doing such a thing is seldom helpful, and most often hurtful to a pastor. Your pastor doesn't need to hear about negative comments. It is discouraging for your pastor to be told, "I heard John Doe say this or that." Rest assured that the Lord also heard John make that negative comment, and He will deal with ole John in due time.

Family Matters Someone in your family is doing drugs, Part 1

that someone in your family is doing drugs, you feel a whole range of emotions. You are stunned, overwhelmed, hurt, heartbroken, ashamed, guiltladen, angry and depressed. It is like getting kicked in the gut. It is one of those "Oh no" days.

You may want to shout or you may just be stunned into silence. You may burst into tears. But when you discover a loved one is using or abusing drugs, it opens up a new chapter in the family life book for you. Almost every week, I have one to three families among what I would call my friends or acquaintances call me about finding out someone in their family is using drugs. They are in crisis mode, and do not know what to do. Here are some things to help you cope when this happens

• Move quickly away from guilt — People are responsible for their own choices in life. I always tell parents who can't believe their child is using drugs, "Welcome to the typical Christian home of today!" About half of all Christian homes will experience someone in their home using drugs. All families will have someone during their lifetime in their extended family use drugs. It may be a cousin, or an in-law, but everyone has them.

You may not be aware of who it is in your family because sometimes people keep it a secret from other family members. But drugs are so pervasive that all families will have this problem. If you include alcohol, the most common drug in our needs. Don't worry or be anxious, but seek the

Talk about a shock! When you first find out America, about 90 percent of all homes will have can be conquered. There may be some hardships someone who engages in this drug use.

Don't feel guilty. I know you do, and it isn't wrong to feel it. It is a natural, normal thing to occur. But you must move quickly beyond it to a more productive emotion. People make their own

If you are an older adult and your adult child starts using drugs, you bear no responsibility. You raised them to know better, and they have made their own choice that goes against what you taught them. That is totally their responsibility.

If you have a child still living at home then, although it is a hard thing to come to grips with, yes, you as a parent do bear responsibility along with your child for the drug use. But even in this case, you have to move ahead on solving the problem rather than scraping your guts Part I Someone In Your Family Is Doing Drugs out forever over what you could have done differently.

You now have to get help, set boundaries etc. There are probably many things you could have done that might have helped, but none of this reflection will do one bit of good in moving your loved one toward healing. Let's get on with the answer.

• Call Jesus first — Before you call a therapist, a friend, a lawyer or whomever; you should follow Scripture as a Christian; and Matt. 6:33 tells us to seek God first, then He will take care of all of

> Lord in prayer and He will give you peace (Phil. 4:6-7).

Jeremiah 33:3 reads, "Call unto me, and I will answer thee, and show thee great and mighty things, which thou knowest not." If you call out to God, He will come to you. He doesn't consider or think about it, He just comes to you! And that is what you need right now the presence of God. He will do great things for you. "For with God nothing shall be impossible" (Luke 1:37). "Nay in all these things, we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us" (Rom. 8:37).

This is not an irreversible, impossible problem for God; and with Christ, even a drug problem

and some troubled days ahead, but we are more than conquerors through Christ.

• Attitude is critical right now — You are either going to fall apart or your family is going to hold together and grow stronger. This isn't your dream for this family member. If it is a spouse, you didn't think about this when you got married. If it is a child, you never dreamed of this when you held them as a newborn.


While this is not the life you wanted, it is the life you have. You have to live life on life's terms right now. You are not going to be victims to drug abuse, but victorious. You are not going to walk around at church seeking pity, but living in the power of Christ. That power is what will deliver your loved one from addictions.

Romans 8:28 tells us that "all things work together for good." Satan wants this to destroy your family, but it can work so that God can get glory, your family be strengthened and you can all be closer than ever before.

So, let's have an attitude adjustment. I am not minimizing the seriousness of this problem, but you must believe, see and hope that from this crisis will emerge a new perspective on life. There will be a restructuring of the family, and you will all focus more on what truly are the priorities of life. Perhaps you have pursued the wrong things in your family in the past, and now God is going to give you a second chance to find redemption, healing and grace.

This is a growth opportunity and a grace event for the whole family. God's grace is getting ready to slosh out all over you because He has said His grace is sufficient to get you through the hard times of life. Sufficiency means nothing else is needed. We will look at treatment options in next week's column.

Once again, this all too familiar statement was made to me, "I'll just fake it till I make it!" The transparency was refreshing but the reality of how often I have lived by the same motto convicted me. All too often we proceed ahead without knowing what we are doing, where we are going, how we will get there, and refusing to admit we need help. All we need is a little more time and we will figure it out? Maybe we will know where we are after two more right turns? If I act like I know what I'm doing maybe nobody will notice I don't have a clue?

One of my favorite commercials is when an emergency occurs that requires the expertise of a doctor. Then the man helping is asked, "Are you a doctor?" To which he replies, "No, but I did stay at a Holiday Inn Express last night." Unfortunately, not knowing what I am doing has never held me back. The temptation can be to never admit that we do not have all the answers and we have not figured everything out. That is why I am committed to being a lifelong learner. Somebody out there knows what I need to know and we should always be on the outlook for them.

Why do we "Fake it till we make it?" Could it be that we are afraid of what people might discover about us? Could we also be afraid that we are no longer the authority on the subject? Maybe we are people pleasers and so we are more focused on impressing them? Here are some attitudes and things that might be indicators that you are trying to fake it till you make it:

First, you think you must always have the answer! This is whay I do not like playing Bible trivia games. It is a no-win situation for a preacher. If you win, "Well of course you did, you're a preacher!" If you lose, "And you call yourself a preacher?" We do not have to always have the answer and we need to admit it when we don't. If we are not careful we can be tempted to make up an answer instead of finding the real answer. One of the best things you can say is, "You know, I'm not sure on that but I will do my best to find out!"

Second, I know what I am doing! Sometimes we are afraid to admit that we do not have it all together and that we are in way over our heads. We may not know how to handle certain situations but there are people around us who do. Who is it that knows what you need to know? Who do you need to talk to that can help you to figure it out? First, ask the Lord! Ed Stetzer says it this way, "Wise planning is not what I decide and then ask God to bless it, but I ask God what He desires of me, and then I pursue it!"

Third, I don't need anybody else. I can do this! Maybe you can, but that is never the best way because two are always



better than one. Tony Morgan has said, "A solo leader might draw a weekend crowd, but it takes a team to create healthy systems that foster sustained growth and opportunities for life change." Should we be willing to do it alone if we have to? Definitely! Is that the best plan? Never! Be careful to not fall into the thinking that if you want it done right you have to do it yourself! If you do not have help now then begin training others so they can help.

Fourth, I'm tired of trusting people and getting burned! No doubt about it, people will let you down and disappoint you but it is worth the risk. Teamwork is messy and it takes.....work! It doesn't just happen but you have to be willing to pour into other people's lives without any guarantee it will ever be beneficial for you or your ministry. Paul said this, "Demas has forsaked me having loved this present world!" The very people with whom you spend a lot of time and invest the most in may walk away but it is still

Fifth, shouldn't they know what we are doing by now! Maybe so, but remember, vision leaks. Communicate what the need is and what the job requires up front. Make it clear! D.A. Horton said, "Disappointment takes place when you expect too much from someone you barely communicate with." All too often we are guilty of placing people in positions without properly preparing them. Could it be that we are faking it till we make it because we were never trained either? In Teams That Thrive Ryan Hartwig and Warrin Bird say, "Less than 20 percent of leadership team leaders have received special training in how to lead teams."

People appreciate transparency and authenticity. No one likes a fake even if they have the best intentions. They do love it when a leader says, "I need your help!" They want to know that it is not only their information and effort that matters but their opinions matter as well. Refuse to fake it till you make it!

Healthy leaders are real, authentic, and genuine!!!







A twenty year legacy

Almost twenty years ago, Peruvian Paul Tinoco heard a Lifeword Spanish broadcast, El Contacto Cristiano and was so "moved by the preaching, the type that makes you feel a fire burning inside," that he wrote a letter to Lifeword. After receiving Tinoco's letter, Ricky Robinson reached out to the late James (Jimmy) Swindoll, who at that time was the nearest BMA missionary serving in Bolivia, and asked him to visit Tinoco, who was touched by Swindoll's personal, follow-up visit.

Later, Swindoll and missionary Jerry Kidd returned to Peru to meet Tinoco. In the following years, American missionaries Marvin Lloyd and Thom South and Bolivian missionary David Flores took part in the ordination of Paul Tinoco as pastor and missionary. At some point during



the two decades that followed, David Dickson (Puerto Rico) continued to oversee and encourage the growing Peruvian work.

Two decades later in July of this year, Luis Ortega was able to witness God's work in Peru through Paul Tinoco when they served alongside a Baptist Medical Missions International (BMMI) team in several villages, including the community of Picoy. The mayor of Picoy was among those who made professions of faith. An enthusiastic new convert, his salvation put him in a particularly difficult position in his largely syncretistic (merging of several religions) tribe, because every year one of his major duties is to fundraise for and plan a large pagan worship celebration for the community, a celebration that now goes against his Christian faith.

Following his conversion, a dialogue began with the mayor as a result of this collaborative team effort, and he offered a piece of land to Lifeword for the installation of a Community Radio (LPFM) station. The granting of permits and licenses is necessary for this small radio station, which will complement the ministry of local BMA missions that is reaching out to the community of Picoy with evangelism and discipleship.

Lifeword's involvement in Peru is continuing to expand beyond Picoy. During Luis' travels in Peru with Paul Tinoco, the Asháninkas, a native tribal group, requested the installation of Lifeword radio stations for their villages. Tribal leaders of the Asháninkas indicated that there are more than 100 communities (of people in that tribe) up and down the river and throughout the Peruvian jungles and mountains. Lifeword and BMA Peru are in dialogue about further partnerships to reach out to this people group, which is perhaps the second largest (after the Quechua) in Peru.

God has blessed the work in Peru, which began with Bro. Paul Tinoco's letter to Lifeword and continues through the efforts of BMA Missions and Lifeword. It is a twenty-year legacy of faith, collaboration and prayer.

Please join Lifeword in prayer for the following: partnerships with the Ashaninkas, the newlyconverted mayor of Picoy, permits and licenses that need to be granted, and plans for Community Radio to come to fruition within a year. As always, Lifeword's desire is that more people will profess Jesus as Lord, become disciples, then disciple-makers.





BMA of America Missions seeks to honor former missionaries to Taiwan

Note: We regret to inform you of the passing of Mrs. Latrell. This article was written prior to her passing and still wanted to publish it to honor her and her family.

Jack and LaTrell Bateman are iconic in BMA Missions history. This faithful and loving couple served for 37 years in and around Taipei, Taiwan. Another longtime BMA missionary, special friend and colleague of the Batemans, Dale Thornton, offered us the following sketch of their life and ministry:

"Jack and LaTrell Bateman were pioneer BMAA missionaries. They were among the first group of missionaries sent out by the association after it was organized in 1950. First, there was Bro. and Mrs. Harold Morris to Brazil, followed by Bro. and Mrs. Z. T. Rankin to Japan and then in November of 1953 Jack and LaTrell left for faraway Taiwan (then called Formosa).

Jack and LaTrell going as a team to Taiwan was in itself a miracle. Jack was born in Tientsin, North China to an American father and a Chinese mother. His father died there and Jack and his brother and sister were caught up in the war with Japan. They were taken by a single American missionary, John Blalock, first to the Philippines. They were captured there by the Japanese and spent three years in a Japanese POW camp. After the war Jack went on to California, where he was saved, and then on to Texas to study at Jacksonville College.

LaTrell was saved when she was nine and surrendered to foreign missions when she was thirteen. She had a burning desire to go to China as a missionary and studied everything she could about China and the Chinese in Lubbock, where her family were members of Central Baptist Church. Then the pastor's son went to Jacksonville College and he reported that he had found LaTrell a "real live Chinaman" who could teach her Chinese. And the rest is history: After a yearlong courtship, they were married in 1950 and then sent out as BMAA missionaries in 1953.

Dr. John W. Duggar wrote two short books about the Batemans. The first, Two for God, was written about the early years of their ministry in Taiwan. The second, The Girl with the Missionary Heart, was published in 1975 as LaTrell's testimony of her call to missions. Even though the Batemans have been retired as missionaries to Taiwan since 1990, their ministry lives on through the souls they won and the churches they planted. They have continued to actively serve the Lord. Bro. Jack at 86 still drives to a small Chinese church in Plano and preaches there once a month. LaTrell, because of failing health, has been limited in what she can do. She is looking forward to going to her eternal, heavenly home.

Dr. Duggar, in the last paragraph of Two for God wrote these words: 'The influence of these two lives for God will live on and on. Their work in far-off Formosa will never be finished. Not only did they give their hearts to the cause of foreign missions, but they gave their very lives on the field itself. They have been the means of reaching many for Christ, and only time will tell and eternity will reveal how many people will eventually be saved as a result of their witnessing to the few who in turn witnessed to others. Jack and LaTrell Bateman, we count you as two of the greatest missionaries that God ever willed to preach and teach the unsearchable riches of Christ Jesus in a land where millions had never heard of Him. Because Christ lived in you."



MLM (Missionary Literature Ministry) director Phil Knott elaborated on the new approach to missionary print ministry, "As with Missionary Literature Ministry projects in Latin America and Asia, a major shift is underway in how Christian literature, Gospel tracts, and other materials are published and distributed in Africa. One of the most important changes is "on demand printing" which more effectively meets local needs and fosters more ownership and sustainability. There are several options available and BMA Missions personnel are working diligently with local leadership to develop the most effective means."

The new approach emphasizes partnerships with national associations to help produce and print literature in their respective countries. This will allow for much greater stewardship as much more literature can be produced with available funds instead of spending large amounts to ship used literature. It also fosters the participation of the national associations in the process.

Knott added, "Missionary Literature Ministry is still very much at work editing, producing and publishing materials in Mexico, Central and South America, Southeast Asia, Brazil, Portugal, Ghana, and the U.S. A Spanish language resource site is available online at www.bmamissions.org/ americalatina "

This new vision for MLM is bolstered by the tireless work of Belinda Caudle in Latin America, a new initiative in Southeast Asia through the printing ministry of BMA Philippines, and your continued support to help produce needed literature in many more countries. Thank you for your support of MLM. Let's all pray that many additional countries will benefit from this needed ministry!

Sunday School lessons

Genesis beginnings

DATE: September 6, 2015

TEXT: Genesis 1:1, 2, 26, 27; 3:1, 7, 15,

12:1-3; 49:1, 2

THOUGHT PRIMER

Mortal beings, all wild life, plant life, and inventions of man have had a beginning—a starting point. But Genesis talks about not just any old beginning, but THE beginning—the starting point of the heavens, the earth and all contained therein. Genesis is the beginning of time—of all substance—all life. And it all began with just a word from the Creator.

This lesson and the 65 lessons to follow, shall be a survey of each book of the Bible. Beginnings is a great to begin.

STUDY

Genesis 1:1: Two major truths come from the first verse of Genesis—(1) The Creator has no beginning, and (2)the beginning of time and "existence" was spoken by the Creator. It is difficult to fathom the idea of a Being having no beginning, but it is confirmed throughout scripture. "But the mercy of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting upon them that fear him, and his righteousness unto children's children." Psalm 103:17.

Genesis 1:2: The earth was without form and void—it is described by one writer as "an empty waste." Matthew Henry describes it as confusion, disorder and emptiness. The spirit of God "hovered" and "brooded" over the waters. This condition ended when God's Spirit engulfed it and caused light.

Genesis 1:26-7: After God spoke wildlife into existence, He created, in His own image, man by taking a lump of clay and breathing His own divine breath into it, making man a living soul. He created them, as with all wildlife, male and female. Man has a marked distinction above every other living creature on earth, in that he is (1) a living soul - he has that component which is designed to commune with his Creator. (2) earthly authority—he controls over every other living thing, as prescribed by his Creator.

Genesis 3:1: Satan appears in the perfect place, Eden, created by God, for the enjoyment of Adam and Eve. Satan is subtile, he poses questions which raise suspicion; he accuses the integrity of the Creator; and he lies to Adam and Eve.

Genesis 3:7: After partaking of the tree of knowledge of good and evil, expressly forbidden of God, Adam's and Eve's eyes were opened—they became cognizant of the marked contrast between good and evil; no longer did they live in a perfect state of innocence as God had so ordered. They sought, by fleshly means, to cover their nakedness.

Genesis 3:15: God pronounced a curse upon Satan. This verse reveals that the crucifixion of Christ is the beginning of the undoing of the wicked one. Satan uses the agents of the unbelieving Jews, Romans, and reprobates, including Judas, to "bruise the heel" of Christ on the cross —but that momentous event crushed the head of the evil one.

Genesis 12:1-3: God commends Abraham: He singled him out from everyone in Haran to be the leader of His chosen people: He commands Abraham: "Get thee out of thy country (Haran) He makes a promise to Abraham—to make him a great nation—to give him a great land, and to protect his people from their

APPLICATION

The earth was formless, dark and full of disorder—that is until the Spirit of God touched it with light and His presence—A life, void of Christ is formless, dark, chaotic, until Jesus speaks life into it. There would be absolutely no creation separate and apart from the power and presence of the great Creator, God, our Heavenly Father.

CHALLENGE

Always embrace and believe God's word about creation. All creation could not have come into being unless an eternal Being spoke it into existence.

Exodus—Liberation

DATE: September 13, 2015 **TEXT:** Exodus 1:13, 14; 2:10; 3:7, 8; 6:6; 12:26, 27; 20: 1-3

THOUGHT PRIMER

This lesson concerning the experiences of the Israelites from bondage in Egypt, to wilderness wanderings, to ultimately inhabiting the land God promised them, reminds me of the song by Babbie Mason:

- God is too wise to be mistaken
- God is too good to be unkind
- So when you don't understand
- When you don't see His plan
- When you can't trace His hand
- Trust His heart.

The Israelites, much like we believers today, who sometimes waiver in our faith, needed to heed the message of this song.

STUDY

Exodus 1:13, 14—The Egyptians were threatened by the growth of the Israelite population. So they forced them into slavery, and for 430 years, the Israelites suffered unmercifully at the hand of the Egyptians, making them work to build Egyptian cities. The more the Israelites suffered, the more they flourished.

Exodus 2:10—God miraculously protected the newborn Moses from being executed by Pharaoh, whose mission was to kill all first-born males. Moses' mother, Jochebed, exercised great faith by turning him loose in the edge of the Nile River to protect him from the king. Ironically, God allowed Pharoah's daughter, to find the baby—who in turn, chose Jochebed to raise her own son for her. Spending his boyhood years in Pharoah's court, he acquired great knowledge

of the Egyptian political system and culture, better preparing him to serve God in a very strategic way-to ultimately lead the Israelites out of bondage.

Exodus 3:7, 8—God reveals Himself to Moses through a dried up, burning bush, which would not burn out. It was a Holy place—a place so Holy, Moses was summoned to take off his sandals. Any place where God meets with His children is Holy Ground.

God told Moses of His plan for him to lead His oppressed people out of Egypt. Moses protested, "Who am I?" God's answer was, ". . . I will be with thee."

Exodus 6:6—Moses was merely in God's hand-God is the One Who devises the plan and brings the plan to pass. ". . . I will bring you in unto the land,...I am the Lord."

Exodus 12:26, 27—This passage is a beautiful type Christ's shed blood for the remission of sin. The Lord sent the death angel over Egypt to smite the first-born of every household, and cattle. But Israelites were spared this tragedy by striking the lintel and two sides of the doorposts of their houses. When the death angel saw the blood, he passed by. Hence, the initiation of The

Exodus 20:1-3—"The Lord delivered His people—and gave them the Law.

APPLICATION

God's plan to liberate His people is perfect. He is faithful to carry His plan through—all His people are required to do is revere the Lord, trust Him, and walk in obedience to Him.

CHALLENGE

Whenever God the Father requires an impossible task from you, remember, the task is not impossible with Him.

JACKSONVILLE COLLEGE

The Beginning

The idea for Jacksonville College was launched in January 1899 in a pastor's home after prayers and a collection of \$23.00 was taken. Later in the spring, The East Texas Educational Society was formed. In June 1899, they applied for a charter for Jacksonville College and in July 1899, eighteen acres were bought for the construction of the College. The purpose of founding the College was to provide an education for the Youth of East Texas. Ever since 1899, Jacksonville College has ministered for Christ under "One Name, One Location, and One Purpose." While the College has experienced many difficult years, JC has also received many blessings.

Jacksonville College is the only two year, faith based college left in the state of Texas. Other such colleges have closed their doors as community colleges have opened up throughout Texas. These community colleges receive local tax support as well as state and federal financial assistance. Jacksonville College does not receive any local tax dollars. JC is dependent upon God and His people, churches, and Associations for support. This financial base has decreased in recent years as churches have closed and/ or decreased in size and giving ability. Jacksonville College also depends upon student enrollment and upon each student paying for his or her education.
